THUNDERSTORM

Was your house struck Tuesday evening? Perhaps you thought it was.

The long, almost unprecedented hot spell was broken after a violent thunderstorm and lightning display starting about 6 o'clock and yesterday's weather was fall-like. It was a great relief to everybody.

There were several claps and smashes by thunder and lightning that were hair-raising and that started people hurrying from their houses to see what was struck. Stouffville escaped damage but was not far from it.

John Smith, farmer on the Townline near the Seventh of Whitchurch was taking a few minutes rest when one of those terrifying electrical discharges shook the house. Like many he went outside to see what tree was struck and found his barn on fire. The alarm soon spread and people in autos from nearby farms and from Stouffville were there in a few minutes to see what aid could be given. The barn, of course was doomed but the live stock, house and out-buildings were saved. The new oats crop, luckily, was still in the fields but 80 bushels of old crop oats 40 tons of hay and 40 bushels of unthrashed alsike clover. The barn had just had a new roof. Whether it was protected by lightning rods or not, and if so, whether the rods had been removed during the making of the new roof was not learned. The loss is said to have been fully covered by insurance.

The storm was accompanied by a heavy downpour of welcome rain in Stouffville at least, and it continued during a large part of the night. People had the first cool sleep they had had for many a day.

While they were getting supper at J. A. Mitchell's, Ringwood, on the 21st, the coal oil stove had a flare-up and trouble was brewing at once. A coal oil fire is hard to extinguish in the absence of certain chemicals generally found in fire extinguisher, combat out the flames with a broom pounds, although some people way.
