#### Only STANDARD HOTELS can sell Soft Drinks

Restaurant proprietors will most likely find themselves guilty of the offence of illegally selling two and a half per cent beer, soft drinks, cigars and cigarettes.

According to the wording of section 146, sub-section 6 of the new Ontario Temperance Act, none but Standard hotels are permitted to traffic in the above mentioned articles.

Sub-section 5 of the Act provides that hotels with Standard licenses shall be entitled to sell all non-intoxicating drinks and beverages, as well as cigars and cigarettes. But sub-section 6 states that "the keeper of any hotel, inn or house of public entertainment not licensed as a Standard hotel, shall not sell or traffic in any of the articles mentioned in the preceding subsection, and any such keeper who violates this section shall be guilty of an offence under this Act, and shall on conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding \$10 and costs."


