Deny Being Drunk

Victims of Auto Accident say they Were Driving Carefully

License Inspector Grier and Mr. Sanderson, of Toronto, who were victims of the automobile accident on the 8th Line of Markham on Wednesday of last week, claim to be innocent of being drunk or of driving at an excessive speed. In an interview they stated that when the accident occurred they certainly must have appeared drunk but this was due to the shock. Both, it appears, were affected in the same manner. They claim that the accident was caused by the car striking a stone on the roadway, which threw the machine into a rut and caused it to skid, and in an effort to regain the track, the auto was cramped short with the result that one of the front wheels was broken. They state that the posts of the railing were unsoand and improperly imbedded in the earth. The two men were returning from a fishing trip to the Black River which they left between 5 and 5.30 taking from that time to between 7 and 7.30 o'clock, when the accident happened. They drove approximately 23 miles. At the time the accident took place they were going at a speed of less than 20 miles an hour. They absolutely deny having had any intoxicating liquor in the car or of having drunk any or of having driven at an excessive rate of speed.

This is their version of the accident. It is understood that a complete investigation of the affair will be made by the Board of License Commissioners.

Church Notes
