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Col. Sam Sharp dies at Montreal

Death due to Fall From Window

Lieut. Col. Sam. Sharpe, M. P., of
Uxbridge, who recently returned from
England, died at the Royal Victoria
Hospital, Montreal, on Saturday,
May 25 as the result of jumping
from a second story window and
falling to the cement pavement
below.

Col. Sharpe had just dressed to
go for a drive which had been ar-
ranged by his nurse, who stated that
he had shown no signs of mental
aberration. He had been suffering
from a nervous breakdown caused
by the strain of severe service at the
Front.

Samuel Simpson Sharpe was the
son of Mr. and Mrs. George Sharpe,
and was born at Zephyr, Scott Town-
ship, in 1873. He received his edu-
cation at Uxbridge Public and High
Schools and later at the University
of Toronto and at Osgoode-Hall.

In 1903 he married Mabel Crosby
of Uxbridge. He followed the pro-
fession of law in that town for a
number of years and was a Major
in the 34th Regiment. In 1908, 1911
and 1917 he was elected Member

to the House of Commons for North
Ontario. In 1916 he raised and
took overseas the 116th Battalion
which has the distinction of being
one of the best Battalions of the
Canadian Forces. He was with his
Battalion at the front for nearly
two years and won the D. S. O. for
distinguished service in France.

Col. Sharpe was well known and
highly honored in this locality. His
loss will be deeply felt not only in
the locality in which he lived, but
in the national affairs of Canada as
well.

Uxbridge citizens had made great
preparations to give him a grand re-
ception on his arrival.

The remains were brought to
Whitby early Monday morning and
lay in state in the County Council
Chamber until the afternoon when
a public memorial service was held.
A military escort from the Military
Hospital at Whitby accompanied the
remains to Uxbridge where the fun-
eral was held yesterday. The body
was interred with full military hon-
ors and a very large number were
present to pay their last tribute to
one who paid the supreme sacrifice.

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MILITARY SERVICE ACT, 1917

PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given that, by
the effect of the regulations of the Govern-
or General of Canada in Council of the 20th
of April, 1918, and the Proclamation of 4th
May, 1918, recently published, every male
British subject resident in Canada, born on or
since the 13th of October, 1897, who has
attained or shall attain the age of 19 years and
who is unmarried or a widower without children
must, (unless he is within one of the classes of
persons mentioned in the schedule of Excep-
tions to the Military Service Act) report as
hereinafter directed on or before the 1st day of
June, 1918, or within ten days after his 19th
birthday, whichever date shall be the latter.

Such report must be in writing and must give his
name in full, the date of his birth and his place of resi-
dence and also his usual post office address.

The report must be addressed to the Registrar or
Deputy Registrar under the Military Service Act of the
Registration District in which he resides (see below) and
shall be sent by registered post, for which no Canada
postage is required.

Young men so reporting will not be placed on active
service till further notice. They must, however, notify
the appropriate Registrar or Deputy Registrar of any
change of residence or address.

On receipt of the report an identification card will be
forwarded by the Registrar which will protect the bearer
from arrest.

Punctual compliance with these requirements is of
great importance to those affected. Failure to report
within the time limited will expose the delinquent to severe
penalties and will in addition render him liable to
immediate apprehension for Military Service.

Killed by Train

Joe Garbutt, of Claremont, was
struck and instantly killed by a C.
P. R. train on Monday morning.
The unfortunate man, who was very
hard of hearing, was crossing the
track at the station and did not notice
the incoming train from the east.
The body was thrown clear of the
track and was very badly mangled.
Both legs and both arms were
broken, the skull was crushed in,
the face pitted by cinders besides
other injuries.

The body was placed in the station
until the arrival of the coroner. The
inquest was adjourned until Friday
morning.

For a number of years Mr. Gar-
butt had occupied a farm just north
of the village but this spring he re-
turned and took up his residence near
Claremont station. His death will
cause deep regret as he was a man
highly esteemed in the community.
Besides his widow he is survived
by one daughter at home. By a former
marriage he is survived by two
sons, Charles and William, and three
daughters, Mrs. Middleton, Mrs. D.
Ballard and Mrs. Hughes.

Mrs. Davis passes away

After a brief illness Mrs. John
Davis passed away at her home on
Tuesday afternoon. Death has laid
a heavy hand upon this family dur-
ing the past two years. Mr. Davis
having died about six months ago,
and the son Floyd was killed at the
front over a year ago. Mrs. Davis'
death was hastened by that of the
latter. Not having received an offi-
cial announcement of his death, she
had buoyed herself up with the hope
that he was still alive, either as a
prisoner or an inmate of an English
hospital. On a recent visit to Tor-
onto she saw a comrade of Floyd's
who told her of having seen him kil-
led. This news seemed to cause a
collapse and death soon followed.

The deceased was in her 61st year.
Mrs. Davis was formerly Miss Mary
Kirby a daughter of the late John
Kirby of Uxbridge. She was held in
high esteem in the community.

The deepest sympathy is felt for
the bereaved family consisting of
Ross, with the Canadian Forces in
England, Frank and Flossie at home.
The funeral is being held this af-
ternoon from her late residence in-
terment being made at Stouffville
Cemetery.

Leave of Absence in case of Hardships

The delegation of farmers to
Ottawa has resulted in a new order-
in-council which provides relief in
extreme cases where conscription
would result in great hardship, the
abandonment of farms or the sale
of farm stock and implements. Ap-
plication for leave can be made by
the man conscripted to the officer
commanding the depot at which he
reports who may refer the applica-
tion to the officer commanding the
district, and in some instances the
case may be brought before Judge
Duff. The order applies to all other
classes of people as well as farmers.

Dog Tax Increase

Here are a few clauses from the
new "Dog Tax and Sheep Protection
Act":

Subject to the provisions of para-
graph 9a of section 400 of the Mun-
icipal Act and of subsection 3 of
this section there shall be levied an-
nually in every local municipality,
upon the owner of each dog therein,
an annual tax of at least \$2 for a
dog, if only one, and \$4 for each
additional dog owned by him and
\$4 for a bitch, if only, and \$6 for
each additional bitch owned by him;
and any such local municipality may
at any time increase such tax.
The owner of a kennel of pure
bred dogs which are registered in
the "Canada Kennel Register" may
in any year pay to the treasurer of
the municipality \$10 as a tax upon
such kennel for that year.

The owner of any dog shall be re-
quired by the assessors to deliver
to them, in writing, a statement of
the number of dogs owned by him;
and for any neglect or refusal to
do so, and for every false statement
made in respect thereof he shall in-
cur a penalty of \$5.

By an order which went into effect
yesterday, passengers on railway
trains must show their tickets before
getting aboard; which will surely
greatly delay trains. This is how it
may work out in the case of women
passengers: Conductor—"Show your
ticket please!" The lady opens her
chatelaine, takes out purse; closes
chatelaine; opens purse; takes out
ticket; closes purse; shows ticket;
opens purse; replaces ticket; closes
purse; opens chatelaine; drops in
purse; closes chatelaine; steps on
board. Multiply this procedure by
the number of female passengers
and daylight saving will become a
myth; days will need to be forty-
eight hours long, and young people
who start on a journey will be gray-
haired by the time they reach their
destination.—Gazette-Chronicle.
