
Over 80 registered letters came to Stouffville Post Office on Monday night containing interest on Victory Bonds held by some of our citizens.

War Charities Act

Many inquiries have been received as to the effect of the War Charities Act, passed at Ottawa, last session on the Women's Institute organ izations in the Province. Inasmuch as the Institutes are under the general supervision of the Ontario Government, and have their accounts regularly audited and make returns to the Department, it has been held that they are not affected by this Act. The Branches may continue, as in the past, they have been doing in raising funds by holding bazaars and entertainments or making collections in other ways. It will, of course, be necessary for them to forward an audited statement of all monies raised for patriotic purposes to the Department of Agriculture every six months. The main object which the authorities had in mind in passing the War Charities was the very desirable one of safeguarding all funds raised for the purpose for which they are intended by the subscribers or supporters.

The Women's Institutes are not required to Secure Permission from any other organization to undertake Patriotic Work, and they are not empowered to grant permission to other organizations or groups to undertake Patriotic Work.

A NEW DISEASE
