War Charities Act

Many inquiries have been received as to the effect of the War Charities Act, passed at Ottawa, last session on the Women's Institute organizations in the Province. Inasmuch as the Institutes are under the general supervision of the Ontario Government, and have their accounts regularly audited, and make returns to the Department, it has been held that they are not affected by this Act. The Branches may continue, as in the past, they have been doing in raising funds by holding bazaars and entertainments or making collections in other ways. It will, of course, be necessary for them to forward an audited statement of all monies raised for patriotic purposes to the Department of Agriculture every six months. The main object which the authorities had in mind in passing the War Charities was the very desirable one of safeguarding all funds raised for the purpose for which they are intended by the subscribers or supporters.

The Women's Institutes are not required to Secure Permission from any other organization to undertake Patriotic Work, and they are not empowered to grant permission to other organizations or groups to undertake Patriotic Work.

CELEBRATE Golden Wedding

On Saturday, May 25, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Malloy celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of their wedding day, at the home of their niece, Mrs. Howard Zavitz, at Coldstream, Ont. A number of relatives and friends gathered together for the occasion and numerous cards of congratulation, including many from Stouffville friends, were received from those unable to be present.

Mr. and Mrs. Malloy were married in Toronto by the late Rev. Dr. Cochrane and the bondsman was Hon. Hugh John Macdonald, now of Winnipeg, Man. Mr. Macdonald was a fellow student of Mr. Malloy at the University of Toronto.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Malloy are natives of York County, he having been born in the township of Vaughan and she in the township of King. Mrs. Malloy is a daughter of the late Job Wells.

Mr. Malloy has always been an active man. After receiving his early education in the country school two miles from home, he went to High School and later entered Queens University with the intention of entering the ministry. Later he studied law for a time. He graduated from the University of Toronto with the degree of Bachelor of Arts and entered the teaching profession which he followed very successfully for a number of years, teaching at Port Rowan, Streetsville, Beamsville and St. Catharines. On account of the poor health of Mrs. Malloy he gave up teaching and for a time carried on a market garden at Forest, Ont. In 1890 in partnership with Mr. J. G. Keefer he came to Stouffville where they bought out The Tribune. Mr. Keefer sold out to his partner three years later and until two years ago Mr. Malloy occupied the Editor's chair.

Mr. and Mrs. Malloy left on Friday last for Coldstream where they are spending a week. We join in congratulating them on the happy occasion and wish them many more years of wedded life together.

A NEW DISEASE
Capt. (Dr.) Dickson, speaking at the Canadian Medical Congress at Hamilton, told of a new disease called botulism which has appeared in the United States and England.
