

**Notes & Comments**

The Manufacturers Association in its campaign to educate the people to the great blessings of a high tariff carefully point out how it has built up Canadian industries. And in the same breath they ask where the revenue is going to come from under free trade, telling us that the largest portion of Canada's present revenue comes from the customs duties. The question is easily answered; the Canadian people will furnish the revenue as they always have.

The war taught us, at least it should have, that the expenditure of labor in the production of luxuries means that people will have to do without or pay more money for the necessities that labor can produce. We have also had it forcibly shown to us that everyone should be engaged in productive labor. That these lessons are not going to remain in the minds of many is evident. Already there are many evidences that the world is hastening back to the same show and ostentation, the "Keeping up with the Joneses" that prevailed before the war. The Toronto Daily Star rightly says:

"In Canada and in the United States there is the same notion that now that the war is over luxury and ostentation are quite legitimate. Is that sound? Luxury and ostentation represent waste of labor and the diversion of labor from the production of the necessities of life. If that waste was wrong in time of war is it not wrong in time of peace? Is there such a surplus of the necessities of life that we can afford to allow labor to be unduly diverted to superfluities? Of course, when the destructive process of war is ended a little more latitude may be allowed. But there is still wisdom in the gospel of the simple life."

Commenting on the action of the Marquis of Aberdeen in parting with a considerable proportion of his estate in the north of Scotland, thirty-seven thousand acres, the New York Outlook says:

What is especially interesting in this incident is the fact that the new proprietor "intends to give an opportunity for all the tenants" on the lands which have been sold "to become owners of their holdings." If, as we judge to be the case, this purpose of the new proprietor has been one of the inducements which has led to the sale, Lord Aberdeen's action is a significant and valuable example for men of wealth in both countries to follow. If we are to meet successfully the great peril to civilization threatened by the Bolshevik movement, those who possess both intelligence and wealth must co-operate in a movement for a better distribution of both intelligence and wealth—of intelligence by a system of free education, including industrial education, and of wealth by just such measures as are being taken in connection with and really as a part of the sale of so large a portion of the Aberdeen estate. If

the leveling which is sure to take place in the present reconstruction period is directed by the higher and better elements in society, it will be a leveling up; if it is not so directed it will be under the control of the unscrupulous and unintelligent; as it is now in Russia, and it will be a leveling down.
