The epidemic of smallpox which is prevalent throughout many parts of the province does not appear to be causing much alarm as it is of an extremely mild form and so far no deaths have been reported. Difference of opinion exists as to whether it is smallpox or just a malignant form of chicken-pox, but in most places precautions are being taken to prevent its spread. All of the Stouffville cases, and there are not 25 as reported by the Toronto Press are very mild and there is little danger of a further spread of the disease. Every case has been put under a strict quarantine and no alarm need be felt. The doctors have been kept busy with the vaccinating needle the last few days.

A case of two has broken out at Bethesda and occasional cases are reported here and there in country districts.

Toronto appears to have the worst outbreak over 3000 cases being reported but the Public Health authorities are getting the epidemic well under control.

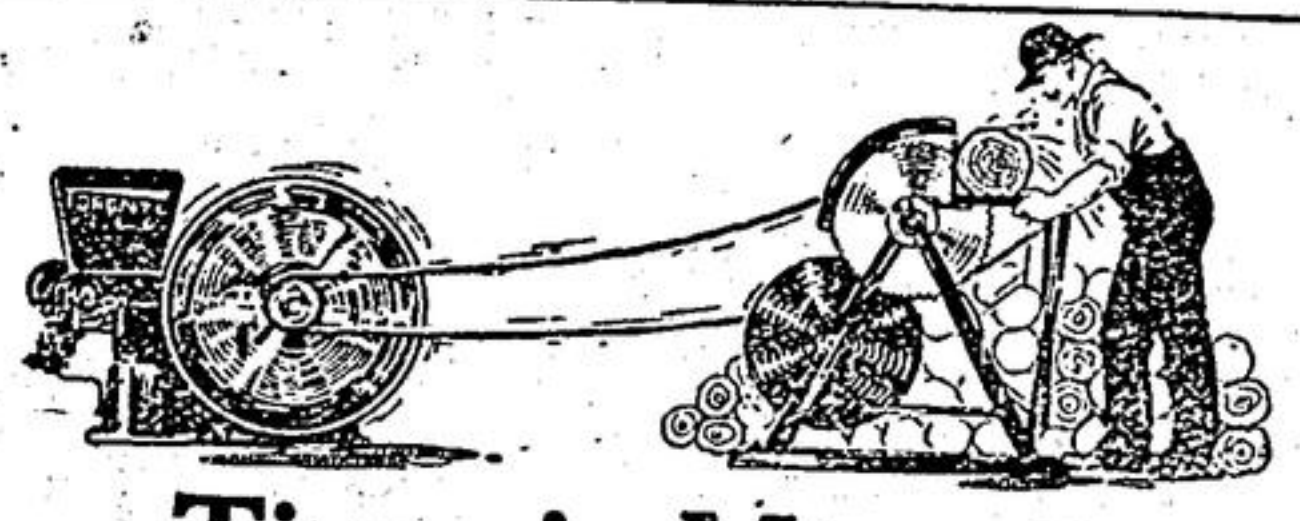
