DEATH OF MR. ANDREW P. HAIG

The sad news was received in Stouffville on Monday morning that Mr. Andrew Haig who recently removed from Ringwood to Cobourg had died on Sunday afternoon. Mr. Haig had been in his usual good health until the previous Monday evening when he took a severe chill followed by a fever. The family physician was called in and declared the symptoms to be those of typhoid fever. But there were other serious complications and later in the week a Toronto Doctor was summoned in consultation. When he arrived Mr. Haig seemed to take a turn for the better and all fears were allayed, but early Sunday morning he began rapidly to sink. Help was again summoned from the city, but he passed away before the physician arrived. Mr. Haig lived on the eighth line of Whitechurch for two years and was esteemed by all as a good neighbor and Christian citizen. His funeral took place on Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock, the service being conducted by Revs. Messrs. Brunner of Cobourg and Young of Stouffville, interment taking place in the family plot at Baltimore. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church, being an elder in the Baltimore church before coming to Stouffville. The sympathy of Stouffville friends is extended to Mrs. Haig and the four daughters, Mrs. Ewing and Miss Muriel of Toronto, Miss Mary who is on the Pacific Ocean on her way to Formosa to serve as a Missionary, Miss Helen at home and to the son Donald who has been in the employ of a lumber company in Northern Alberta.
