The finding of a suitable location for the library has been a difficult task. The first site . chosen W. R. Sanders was the F. C. Rowbotham lot the offer of which was withdrawn because of delay in acceptance due to opposition to that location. The Todd lot was offered at that time but objection was made that the price was too high. Provincial Library Inspector, Carson was called out and he strongly favored the Baptist church lot. A movement was started to secure it. At first the church was unwilling to dispose of it but finally consented to do so if part of Mr. Alex Grubin's lot could be obtained. After several weeks of fruitless negotiations the general feel ing has arisen that something should be done at once so plans could be made to start work early in the
