Board of Trade will buy Todd lot

The Carnegie Library will be built on W. H. Todd's lot. That is the decision that the Board of Trade arrived at on Friday evening at a special meeting called to finally settle this vexed question.

The finding of a suitable location for the library has been a difficult task. The first site chosen was the F. C. Rowbotham lot the offer of which was withdrawn because of delay in acceptance due to opposition to that location. The Todd lot was offered at that time but objection was made that the price was too high. Provincial Library Inspector, Carson was called out and he strongly favored the Baptist church lot. A movement was started to secure it. At first the church was unwilling to dispose of it but finally consented to do so if part of Mr. Alex Grubin's lot could be obtained. After several weeks of fruitless negotiations the general feeling has arisen that something should be done at once so plans could be made to start work early in the spring.

On Friday evening the following resolution was passed. "That in view of the difficulty in securing the O'Brien Avenue lot we accept the offer of the Todd lot as per option. The committee had secured an option on this lot at \$600. A resolution was passed expressing the appreciation of the Board of Trade to those who made an effort to secure the O'Brien Avenue lot.

The canvassing committee, elected at a previous meeting, was reappointed with the exception of Mr. Ratcliff who asked to be relieved of the position of chairman. F. C. Hessel was elected in his stead. The War Veterans asked for the use of the Park for a field day. This was left for the Executive to decide the most suitable day.

Stouffville Teacher Training
The Stouffville Teacher Training class under the leadership of Mr. L. C. Fletcher have completed the second book in their course, entitled "The Teacher" six tried on the second examination in the course which was held last Saturday night, Mar. 11th. Of those who tried, all received a high standing, the average per cent being 91.8. The successful ones were: Mrs. Lee, Miss L. Raymer and Miss B. White of Stouffville, Methodist S. S.; Miss N. Stapleton of Stouffville Christian S. S.; Mr. and Mrs. Eli Lehman, of Altona Union S. S.

Next Saturday night, March 18, at eight o'clock at the home of Mr. Arthur Stowton, the class will begin the third book in the course, entitled, "The Teacher's Study of the Life of Christ" by W. G. Barclay, all interested, both young and old, in the cause of Christ in the Stouffville Sunday Schools are cordially invited to attend, regardless of denomination or sect. We have every reason to believe that a union of the Sunday school and public school teachers of our village for the common welfare and Christian nature of our boys and girls will become in the near future a village institution.

A MYSTERIOUS FIRE
A very mysterious and unforeseen fire occurred on Monday at Abram Brown's business premises which for a short time threatened the destruction of the whole business block. Mr. Brown gives the following account of the fire: "I was not there myself, two Toronto oil dealers were unloading gasoline and coal oil at the back of my shop. Pouring it from barrels to tank when all at once with out any apparent reason, a mighty flame went high in the air, which looked bad for a little while. Neither of the men smoke, and there was no fire near". The fire brigade was called but before they got there the fire was smothered out. The men were slightly burned about the arms and face, but outside of that there was not more than 5 or 10 dollars worth of damage done. Now what started that fire?

Late Mrs. D. Rusnell

The death occurred on Sunday last of Mrs. Daniel Rusnell, a well known resident of Stouffville.

The late Mrs. Daniel Rusnell was born in Scotland and came with her parents to this country at the age of 5 years, landing in Toronto in the year 1817 then known as Muddy York. After a short stay there they moved east along the Kingston road near Pickering Village, where they lived about 5 years, then seeing a chance to buy a small farm in Uxbridge they located near the south end of the Sixth Concession, where her father worked at his trade as weaver of the finest cloth of every description also carpets. Mrs. Rusnell used to help her father fill the loom, fill bobbins, reel of the yarn and she still had many blankets, shawls, and pairs of his make up to her death.

In 1861 she married Daniel Rusnell also of Uxbridge Township. Starting out in life they bought 100 acres of land on the 5th concession all heavily timbered. They soon commenced to clear a place to build on and after a few years of hard labor they succeeded in having a good and comfortable home for themselves, Mrs. Rusnell helping clear the land and doing outside work as well as her household duties. In 1889 they retired coming to Stouffville to spend the remainder of their days where they made a host of friends. The deceased had been a great sufferer with rheumatism and has been an invalid for many years but bore it all with the greatest Christian fortitude.

Her husband predeceased her 16 years ago. Both passed away on the Lord's Day and both in the month of March, they identified themselves with the church of Christ in early life and living and dying in the faith of Eternal Life. There still remains to mourn the loss, one son D. H. Rusnell of Stouffville and Mrs. R. George of California, six grandchildren and six great grand children. The remains were interred in Stouffville cemetery. There was a short service at the house, conducted by C. W. Petch.

A funeral service will be held of the late Mrs. Rusnell at Church of Christ West end on Lord's Day, March 19th at 2.30 p.m. Conducted by C. W. Petch. Friends and acquaintance are cordially invited to attend.
