THE CURE OF WORRY

The above was announced in the Tribune as the subject for last Sunday Morning's discourse in one of our local churches, but the pastor did not acknowledge it as being in proper form and reflected on the accuracy of newspaper announcements generally.

Now, it would be a revelation to the public to get a glance at some of the copy which an Editor is requested to insert in his paper. Some communications would require what we might designate a mental inspiration to decipher their contents, yet some writers fail to note that their calligraphy is not very legible to others, and is apt to result in what to them are inaccuracies when it appears on the printed page.

Many letters reach the Editor's table weekly for publication, all of which he has to scan carefully to protect himself against giving offence to any of his readers or becoming amenable to an action for libel. Harmless looking articles may contain very objectionable matter and must be promptly consigned to the waste basket. Publication is requested sometimes for articles reflecting upon the conduct or character of some individual, but the author wants it inserted anonymously or as an Editorial so as to place the odium on the Editor, of course. Even business men in their copy for charge of ad. have been known to include matter libelling an opponent. Such are some of the things which require the vigilant attention of the Editor, and as a rule he seldom or never goes out of his way to intentionally offend or unfairly criticize.

From the above it would appear that an Editor should have the cordial support of all his patrons. He should be furnished with items of local news whenever possible so as to make The Tribune thoroughly representative of the whole community.

The copy, however, had been very indistinct, and I think under the circumstances, those in my employ did their best, as our type-setting machine was out of commission for a portion of the day of Wednesday of that week.

The Library Question

Mr. Editor:—I read with considerable amusement and interest the article in your last issue from a member of the Library Board in connection with their selection of the Rowbotham lot as the site for the New Public Library and it appears to me that the article itself showed the weakness of the said Board in making the said selection. But the most amusing part of the said article was the statement that they had chosen a Lot that was acceptable to a majority of the Citizens of this Village. The writer of

the said article must be either trying to deceive himself or he is absolutely out of touch with public opinion in this place. Aside from six or seven members of the Board of Trade (and some of these are also members of the Library Board) and four members of the said Library Board, I personally have not heard a single solitary citizen of our Village say one word of approval of the action of the said Board in selecting the Rowbotham Lot and what reasonable-thinking or unbiased citizen would approve of it after Mr. Carson the Inspector of Public Libraries, had written the Board some months ago that it would be a matter of everlasting regret to the people of Stouffville if they built the Library on the Rowbotham Lot. On the other hand I have heard scores and scores of our citizens condemn the action of the said Library Board in language that would not look very well in print. And not only do our present citizens condemn it, but I have heard many of our ex-citizens, among them Clergyman and ex-Reserves, condemn the Board in no uncertain language for their said action.

Now if the Member of the Library Board who wrote last week's article is sincere in his statement, he should have no hesitation in accepting the challenge that I am about to make to him and his co-members. This Library question is certainly one in which every citizen is interested and therefore is a question on which every citizen should have an opportunity to express his approval or disapproval. It is unreasonable that a matter of this importance should be settled by five or six men when some of these have little or no financial interest in our Village. I therefore challenge the said Library Board to submit their action in selecting the Rowbotham lot for our New Library to the votes of their fellow citizens, and if a majority vote in favor of the said site, I will personally pay the whole expense of taking the said vote but if on the other hand a majority of our citizens vote against the said site, then the members of the Library Board should resign. This is one way they can test public opinion and ascertain whether they retain the confidence of their fellow citizens or stand utterly condemned by them. I am, and always have been, ready and willing to submit, as every citizen should be, and the members of the Library Board should also be ready and willing to submit and abide by the majority vote of the electors.

In conclusion, let me say that I do not for one moment desire in any way to depreciate the value of the Rowbotham Lot as this Lot is in my humble opinion and in the opinion of many others who have discussed the question, a very valuable Lot for business purposes and should be kept for that purpose, especially when good business sites are now so scarce in our Village.

Thanking you, Mr. Editor, for this opportunity of placing my views on this matter before our citizens for the first time through the medium of the Press and I say for the first time, advisedly as I have heard that I have been accused of writing some of the previous articles on this question that have appeared in the columns of your paper.

Board of Trade

On Monday night, a General Committee meeting was held in the Ratcliff building, Mr. F. C. Hessel, President, in the chair.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted.

The business of the evening principally consisted of making arrangements for the Dominion Day celebration. The price of admission decided on was 25c. for the afternoon sports and 25c. for the evening concert, with the admission charge for children at 10c. A charge of 10c. will be charged for the Grand Stand in the afternoon, and in the evening, it will be free. A fee of 25c. will be charged for cars being parked on the grounds. Prizes of \$6.00, \$4.00 and \$2.00 are being offered for the best decorated stores or dwellings. Two banners are to be placed in the town—one at the west end, near the station, and one at the entrance to the Park.

A Baseball Tournament will be held and a football match will be played, for which excellent prizes are being offered. The teams chosen for these competitions will be the best that can be secured and should be well worth witnessing. An O. B. A. Umpire will be secured for the Baseball.

\$15.00 will be offered to the best Tug-of-war team, in the contest, four teams competing.

The Board of Trade has agreed to give the use of the field and the grand stand to the Baseball team, free of charge.

Friday afternoon is expected to be a busy afternoon. The Board of Trade invite all the residents of the town to the park for the purpose of cleaning up, spreading the clinders, and doing a little general repairs. You are all invited to come and bring your shovel, hammer, rake, wheelbarrow, or anything else you can bring to help along in the good cause. Refreshments will be served.
