### CONSTABLE SCOTT MAKES GOOD CATCH

It will be remembered that James A. Gibson was injured and his buggy smashed on the evening of August 23rd last when Mr. Gibson was sitting in his rig in front of Leslie Armstrong's gate at the foot of Hagerman's Hill, talking to the latter when a passing motor car struck the rig and threw it in the ditch. 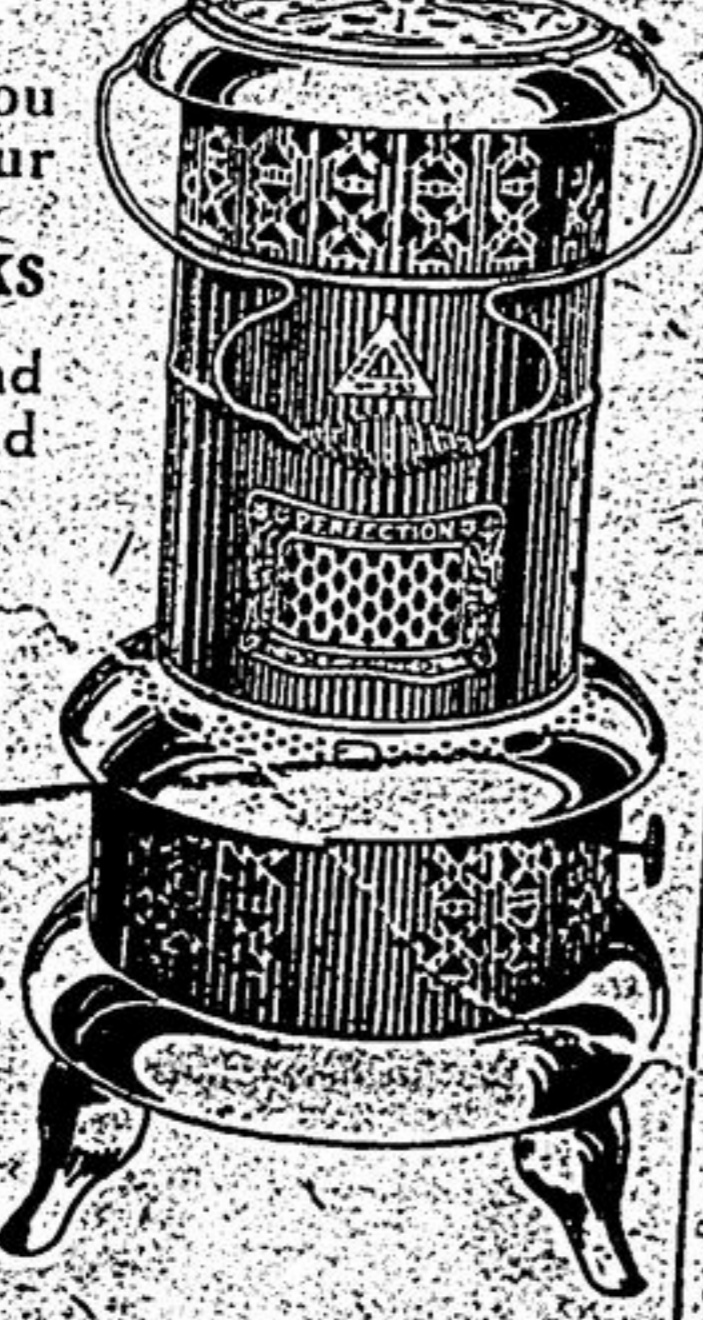
