Music and Fire

The conflagration was of serious proportions, and although there was an insurance of \$18,000 the loss to the firm is said to be heavy. Uxbridge had big fire on Tuesday

A serious fire occurred in Uxbridge early Tuesday morning when the old Plank House hotel property situated on the corner of the Main street, was totally destroyed.

The alarm was sounded at 3 o'clock, and the brigade succeeded in saving the Campbell tailoring shop across the archway. Even the heavy brick walls of the building lie low in the ruins.

The property has been used as a garage by Beare Bros. and part of the upper storey was occupied by Mr. Beare as a dwelling. His wife happened to be away from home on the night of the fire, but Mr. Beare had to get out by the fire escape. Nothing was saved excepting one automobile. Fortunately the stock of new ears was low, although quite a number of second hand ones were destroyed.
