David Kendrick's Will

Probate of the will of David Kendrick, a retired farmer, who died Nov. 23, 1922, in Stouffville, leaving an estate of \$23,018, consisting of a personality of \$20,018 and real estate in the township of Whitechurch to the value of \$3,000, has been granted to Roy D. Kendrick and Nellie May Liberty. Nellie M. Liberty, daughter, gets a specific legacy of \$5,000, to be paid within one year of Mr. Kendrick's death, and one-third of the residue. Gertrude Byer daughter, gets the same as her sister, and Roy D. Kendrick, son, gets a legacy of \$6,500 and the remaining third of the residue.

The annual meeting of the Newmarket Hotel Co. was held last week, in their property the King George Hotel, Newmarket. The shareholders were presented with a 7 per cent dividend, together with a bonus of 3 per cent. The dividend does not represent all the year's profit, for Mr. and Mrs. Brown who conduct the hotel were presented with a cheque for \$500 in addition to their salary of \$1500, and \$2000 was invested in Victory Bonds. Gross receipts for the year were \$23,000. Whoever says a temperance hotel cannot be made to pay, may reverse their opinion by investigating this hotel since 1910.

Died Suddenly in B. C.

The Salmon Arm, B.C., paper contains the death announcement and obituary on the life of J. W. Helsey a former resident of Stouffville until 15 years ago when he went west. The late Mr. Helsey's mother is still living at Lemonville, while a sister Mrs. S. Strong resides at Sliam, Uxbridge township, Mr. Jos. H. Mertens just west of Stouffville is a brother-in-law to the deceased. The Salmon Arm paper says:

"The people in the Valley in the vicinity of Dolan's Corner were shocked last Wednesday, Dec. 13, to hear of the death of John Wesley Helsey, which came with surprising suddenness. A day or so previous he was working around his farm with his usual activity. He was a first-class farmer and a man of sterling qualities.

All that knew him liked him, for he was a respected and obliging neighbor, and his loss is sorely felt by his friends throughout the Valley. The late Mr. Helsey was born in Ontario, and about fifteen years ago went to Castor, Alberta, where he was engaged in farming. Two years ago he purchased the Kernaghan farm in the Valley, where he has since resided. Mr. Helsey was in his 47th year, and leaves a wife and daughter in Salmon Arm, a mother and sister in Ontario, and another sister in Didsbury, Alberta. The sympathy of the community, which is widespread and heartfelt, is extended to the bereaved family."

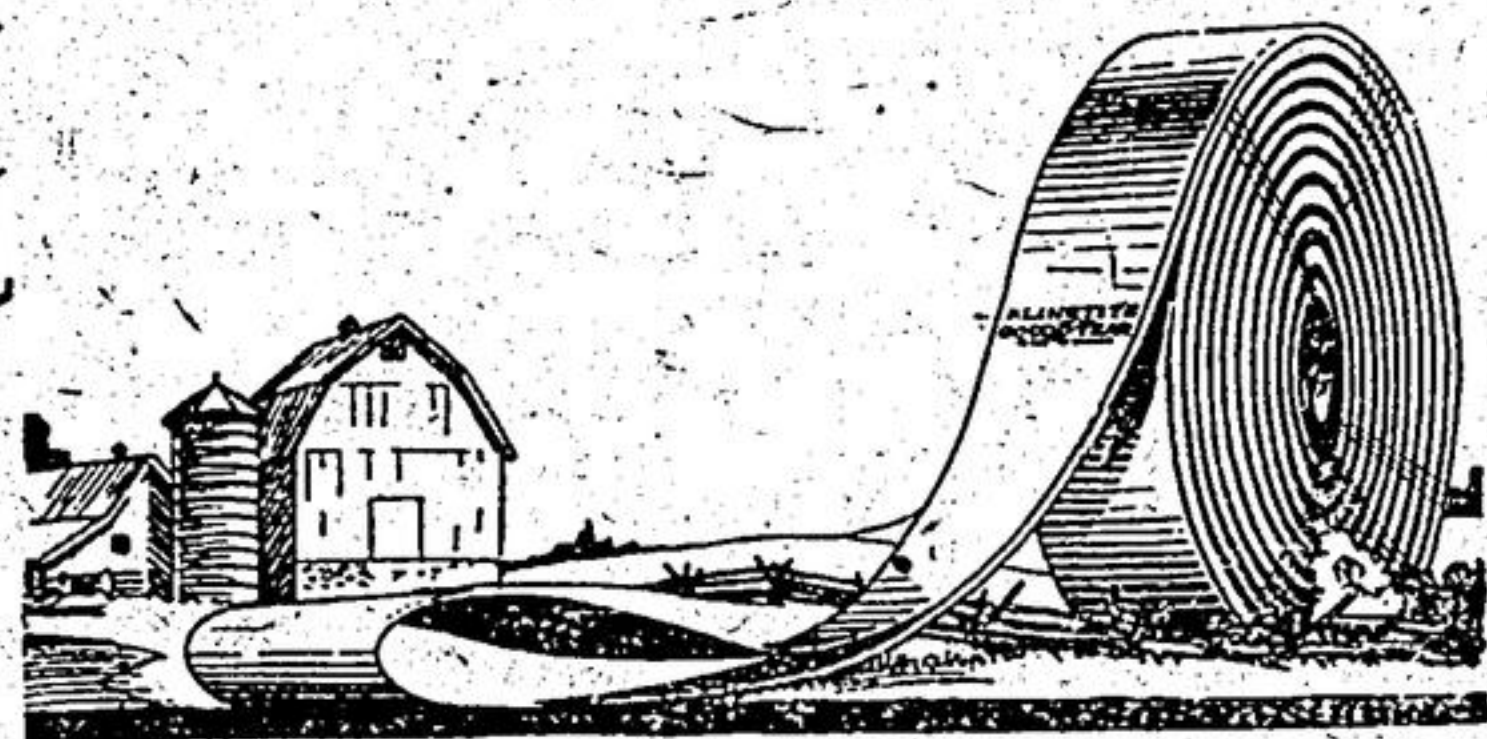
