Ernest Morganson was appointed a member of the Board of Health and Distin McDonald Health Inspector for current year. E. W. Davis was made school attendance officer.
Mr. Roach gave notice that at the next meeting he would move to introduce a bylaw to appoint pathmasters, pound keepers, etc.

The inaugural meeting of Whit church Township Council for 1923 was held at the Township Hall, Vandort, January 8th as provided by statute.

Messrs. J. F. Playter and Thos. Brown appeared before Council re their sheep claims laid over from previous meeting but no action was taken on either claim.
The Treasurer was instructed to pay following accounts viz:—St. Michaels Hospital, for 91 days maintenance Delbert Newton \$136.50; W. R. Capell, for 35 loads gravel \$10.50; Arthur Vernon, for work with team &c. on T.L.N. \$4.00; P.C. Ball, 75 loads gravel for Bogartown sideroad \$15.00; Western Assurance Co., premium insurance on Township hall \$45.00
Account of York County Hospital for maintenance J. Colborne was laid over for further consideration.
The Clerk was instructed to order 450 dog tags and six copies of Municipal World for 1923.
The Reeve was appointed Commissioner to expend a grant of three hundred dollars to gravel sidewalk bet. lots 20 and 21, con. 4.
A bylaw was passed authorizing the Reeve and Treasurer to borrow by way of overdraft from the Standard Bank to the amount of Twenty thousand dollars to meet the present overdraft and future expenditure as required.
By by-laws regularly passed the following were appointed Township officers for 1923, viz:—Medical officer of health, Dr. G. W. Williams, member board of health, H.P. Smith V.S.; auditors, J. A. M. VanNostrand and J. M. Grove, Assessor, J. A. Clarke
Council adjourned to meet again at the same place Wednesday, Feb. 14th next at 10 o'clock a.m.

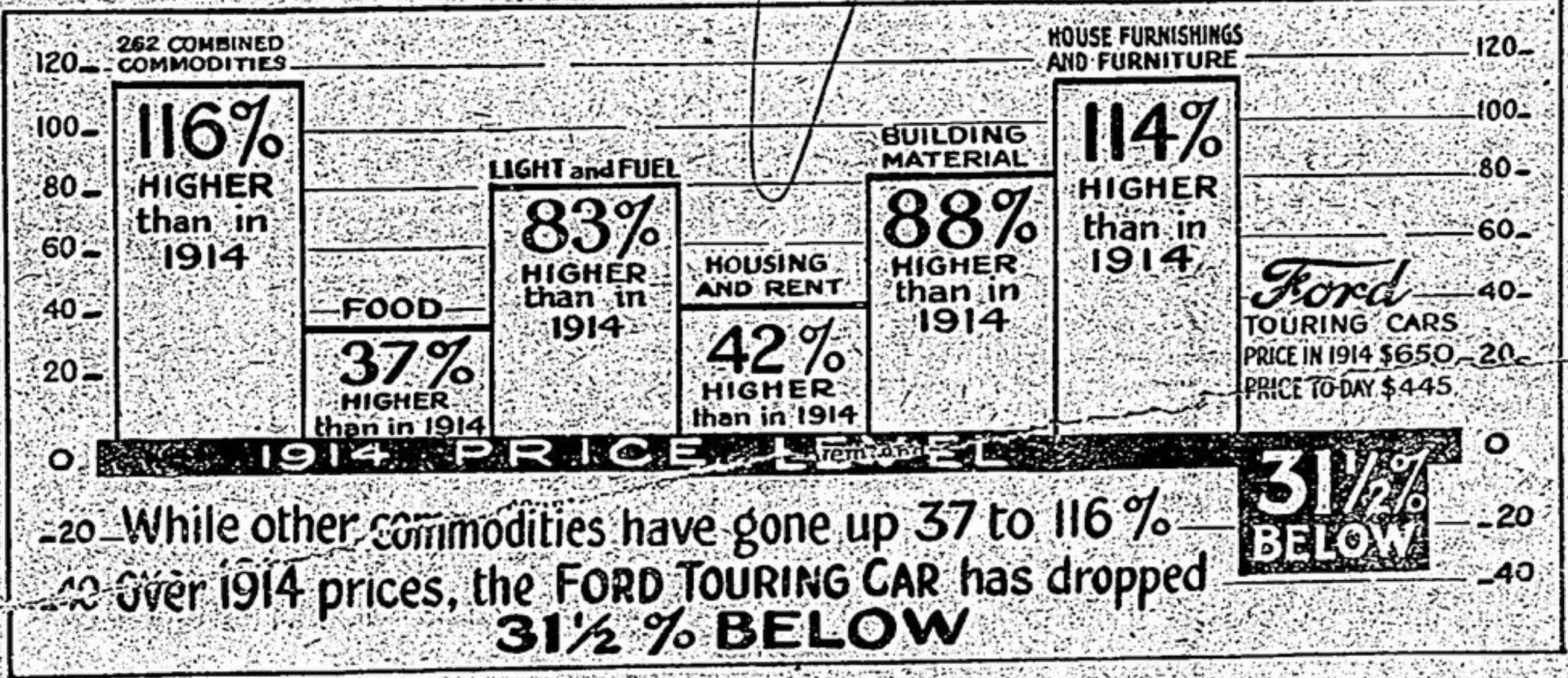
ALTONA
