EDITORIAL COMMENT

Probably the oldest municipal officer in Ontario is Nathaniel Vermilyea, of Thurlow Tp., Hastings Co. He was returned Reeve again this year by acclamation for his 44th term.

There will have to be additional polling booths in many townships owing to the change in the Municipal Act whereby women voters will be added to the voters list book. About 600 additional names will be added to Whitchurch list alone.

The St. Thomas Council has petitioned the Ontario Legislature to extend the term of municipal councils from one to two years. We are not so sure this would be a wise change, as the majority of municipal councils get two years anyway, and there is usually dissatisfaction against a council if they are turned out of office in one year. Such an act would lessen the power of the voter to shake off an indolent council.

Former Emperor William of Germany fooled the reporters and camera men, by having one of his aides who much resembled him in person, to parade about the grounds of his castle with his bride. If Premier Drury wishes to put over a similar coupe on the camera man in Ontario, he might employ Mr. Dave Aitchison of Stouffville as his "double in impersonating the premier.

An exhibit at the recent International Live Stock Exposition at Chicago showed two flocks of hens, one that had been culled until it contained only eight birds and one, uncultured, that contained twelve birds. Each flock had produced approximately the same number of eggs during a year, but the larger flock had cost \$7.20 more to keep, without counting extra labor, extra housing room and extra capital invested. Any poultry keeper can easily learn the few simple rules for culling a flock.

Britain is beginning to liquidate her debt to the United States to the uttermost farthing, she is paying the States a larger sum of money than any government in the world ever paid another. In order to pay the interest on the colossal amount every man, woman and child in Great Britain must find \$4 each per year to meet the interest charges alone.

With the financial standing of Stouffville in good shape, and with cheap domestic water in great quantities, and the best class of citizens in the world, there should be no reason why industrial concerns cannot be induced to locate here, when we once get electric power. This town is ideally located, and shipping facilities are better than in many manufacturing towns. The power and light situation is the only thing any town can discount us on.
