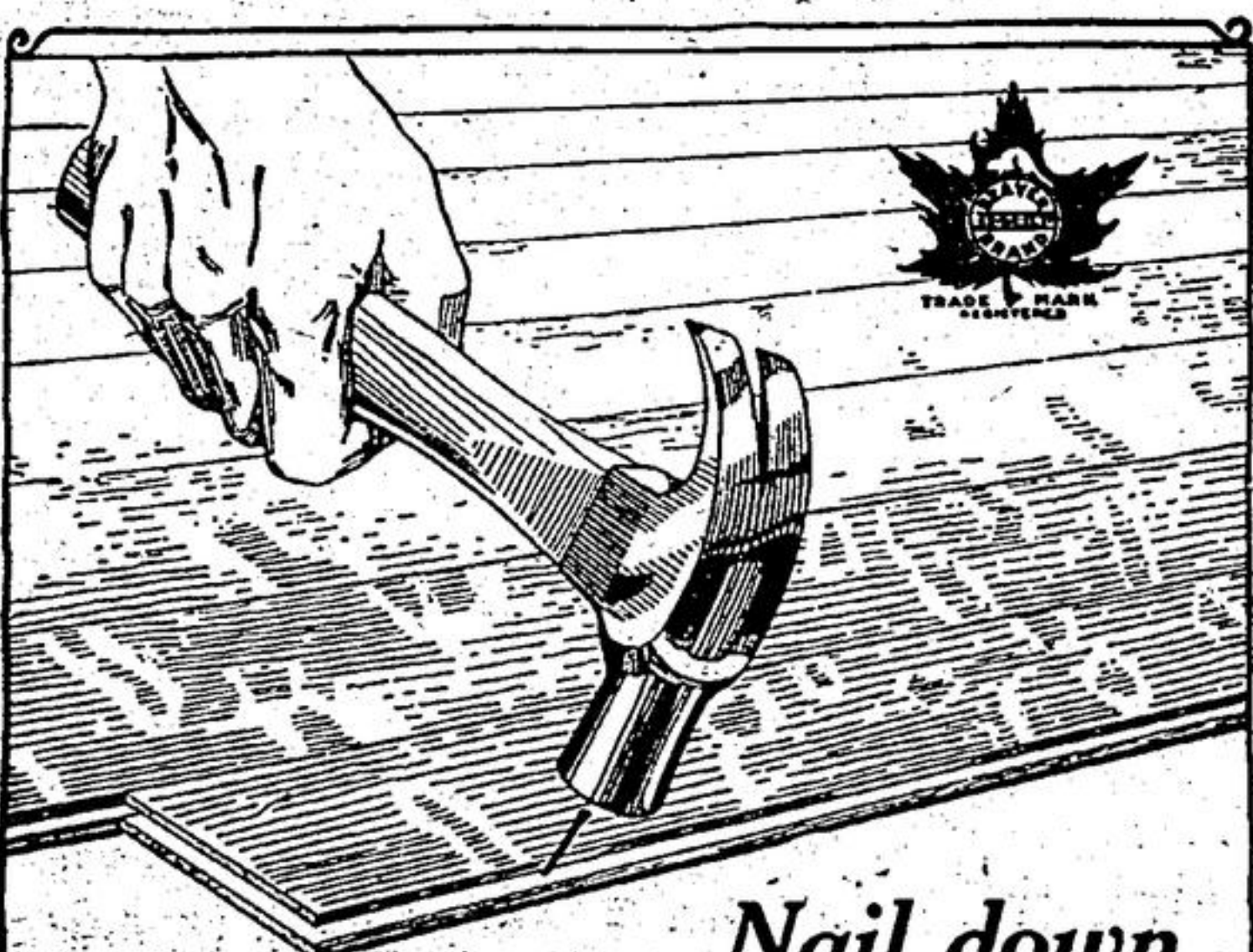

GRADING NOT POPULAR

The hog grading demonstration at the stock yards on Monday interested a large number of farmers. The demonstration, so far as we could gather, didn't win any converts to the new method of marketing hogs, some expressing the opinion that the official in charge was too exacting. This wasn't born out by the facts however, for when the shipment was again "culled" in Toronto, there were fewer "selects" than the demonstrator placed in that class at the local yards.

UXBRIDGE TP. COUNCIL

The Council met at Goodwood Feb'y 17th with the members all present, the Reeve in the chair.

The following communications were read:

From Miss E. McKay, County Treasurer, enclosing list of lands liable to be sold for taxes during the present year; from W.W. Dunlop, Inspector of Aystums, stating a patient from this township had been admitted to institution at Whitby.

The auditors' report was presented by Mr. Todd and received and adopted on motion of Mr. Roach seconded by Mr. Cassie.

The S. A. O. presented his report for January, which was adopted on motion of Mr. Lee seconded by Mr. Catherwood.

The Committee appointed re complaint respecting Mrs. Kumpass, who was recently burned out of her home presented their report which was adopted. Reeve Owen Davis informed the Council that Mrs. Davies had consented to take Mrs. Kumpass and her two children in for the winter, and had been able to interest the Ladies' Aid in the care and with their help secured the loan of a knitting machine and a number of articles of clothing, the product of which the different merchants in town will buy. Mr. and Mrs. Davies are to be commended for what they have done in helping this woman and two children. Mrs. Kumpass we understand had stored in a shed about 45 bushels of oats, which she had intended to bring to town and some time during one night last week some person broke into the shed and stole it all.

On motion of Mr. Roach seconded by Mr. Cassie a bylaw was introduced and passed appointing Pathmasters, Poundkeepers, Fence Viewers, and Sheep Valuers for the current year.

Mr. Roach gives notice that he will at the next meeting move for leave to introduce a Bylaw for fixing the rates to be paid for labor by the Council during the year. Reeve Davies suggested to the Council to start at the top.

Accounts were ordered paid to the extent of about \$300.
