LOCAL HAPPENINGS

The postoffice will close on Good Friday at 11 a.m. and remain closed until evening mail time.

The next regular meeting of the Town Council will be held on Saturday evening this week, March 31. Note the change of date.

A fire on March 26th entirely gutted the large Clark block in Englehart, New Ontario, in which was situated the office of Dr. Harry Wilson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Wilson of this town.

The roads between Stouffville and Toronto are now getting quite passable, and motor trucks are resuming the hauling between these points. At Unionville the road across to Yonge street is used to Toronto. The usual route over the Kennedy road will shortly be in use again.

Work is to commence right away on remodeling the upper story of the Silvester block over the hardware store, which will be fitted up for dwelling apartments, and thus assist in relieving the house shortage which is forcing people to move to other localities, and keeping still others from moving into our town.

The last kick of winter may not yet have been felt. Although Mar. 21st is the beginning of the spring period, last Sunday was a real old fashioned winter day, and early Monday morning the thermometer registered at zero. Sufficient snow fell to renew the sleighing somewhat, which was about done last week.

Now that we are to have hydro, have got our new library nearly completed, good stores, 7 churches, domestic water, one of the best schools, and a probability of an electric railroad to Toronto, would it not be a good idea to have a few thousand advertising stickers purchased for the boosting of Stouffville. These stickers could be placed on the back of all the letters sent out of Stouffville.

Thos. Bentley who lives on the 6th concession of Uxbridge township has advertised two farm stock sales this winter, but has never yet held a sale. Now the third one is advertised for April 3rd, and its three times and out, for Mr. Bentley says there will positively be no postponement this time. The lodge received invitations from Aurora and West Toronto to celebrate the glorious 12th of July, which were laid over until the next meeting for discussion. The lodge is in a flourishing condition at the present time and a special effort is being made to get all the members out to the meetings. Classes will be held for degree work, which will help to make the meetings a real source of pleasure and instruction to the members.

An inspector from the Ontario Inspection Dept. of the Oshawa district, which territory we are in, in respect to electric wiring, was in town last Friday and passed the wiring on five houses preparatory to the coming of hydro power and light. In most cases these houses were being wired for the first time, and there is some disappointment expressed by the owners that they are not able to have their houses lighted by the local electric plant until hydro is installed. The refusal is explained by the local authorities by the fact that they have not sufficient power for the present patrons of the plant, and the taking on of another dozen houses might develop such a load as to break the plant down entirely. This makes it all the more urgent that hydro should be rushed as quickly as possible.
