### MARKHAM T.P. COUNCIL

Damages Claimed for Heavily Laden Milk Truck—SubDividers Ask Water from Richmond Hill

The members were all present at the regular meeting of the council on Monday last week at Unionville.

The Oakvale Dairy of Toronto asked the council to pay a repair bill for \$340.92 damages done to a big truck by running into a washout hole in the road on the 4th concession at Buttonville, also for the loss of two cans of milk/spilled. The accident occurred about the 29th of March. The council were of the opinion that they were not liable for damages in this case. The hole complained of was caused by the melting of the snow, and was therefore an act of nature of which they were not aware at the time, and further that from information received they believed that the truck was operating contrary to the "Loads of Vehicles Act," carrying a load of about 60 100-lb. cans of milk; if this was the case the owners could not recover damages but were liable to a penalty for breaking the law. The clerk was instructed to notify the Oakvale Dairy Co. to that effect.

J. T. Jenkins claimed compensation for damages done his cutter through accident in overturning on Gamble sideroad in March, caused by state of road, and Mr. Gohn was appointed a commissioner to investigate and adjust matters if he thought the municipality was liable.

The Dominion Board of Railway Commissioners wrote recommending that the trees along the roadway on the sid road, lots 5 and 6, con. 9, for a distance of 200 feet of the C.P.R. railway crossing be trimmed to a height of ten feet. This is where Mrs. Hilliard Fleming was badly injured when the motor car her husband was driving was struck by the train.

James, Proctor & Redfern, township engineers, approved of the plan for sub-division of lots 4 and 5, con. 11.

A resolution was passed appointing the whole council and Engineer James a commission to meet Richmond Hill council and see what could be done in the matter of an agreement.

A. D. Bruce was heard responsible of owners of gravel pits as to accidents, and was assured by the reeve that the council assumed all responsibility when gravel for the use of the municipality is being taken out.

Mr. Bruce also was heard on behalf of the Stouffville and Bethesda and Home Telephone Cos. respecting the trimming and removal of obstructing trees necessary in running their lines. Without a bylaw to that effect the owner of the land along the roadside had full control of the trees in front of his property, and not a limb could be removed without his consent. In one or two cases people had objected to any trimming whatsoever. He did not want permission to butcher or trim trees indiscriminately, but he wished the council to pass a bylaw which would leave the matter in the hands of an inspector or the council to determine the matter in case of objection by the owner.

He submitted a bylaw in force in Whitchurch township, which provided that any person, firm or corporation affected by the planting of trees upon the highways or by-ways already planted thereon, if so determined necessary by the council. The members of the council thought Mr. Bruce's request a reasonable one and passed a similar bylaw to take immediate effect.

Mr. Forster, assessor, suggested that the general township school levy be raised from \$600 to \$800 or better still \$900, to be fair to the smaller sections. The members of the council were appointed a commission to inspect the roads and bridges of the municipality and will go over the roads the third week in May.

A resolution was passed petitioning the President and Directors of the Canadian National Railways to improve the service on the Midland Division by running a morning train to Toronto to reach the city not later than 9.30 a.m. and to leave the city about 7 p.m.; also that an electric car service be inaugurated to meet suburban conditions arising in the township, to run into the city on the proposed Toronto Eastern line.

A bylaw was passed increasing the salary of the clerk and treasurer from \$1,000 to \$1,250. The work of this official has more than

doubled during the past two years and necessitates more help. The clerk also provides his own office which for rental and fuel would cost at least \$250 a year.

The reeve was appointed com-

missioner to build a concrete bridge at lots 30 and 31, con. 4.

Council adjourned to meet on Monday, June 4th for general busi-

ness and as a Court of Revision.
