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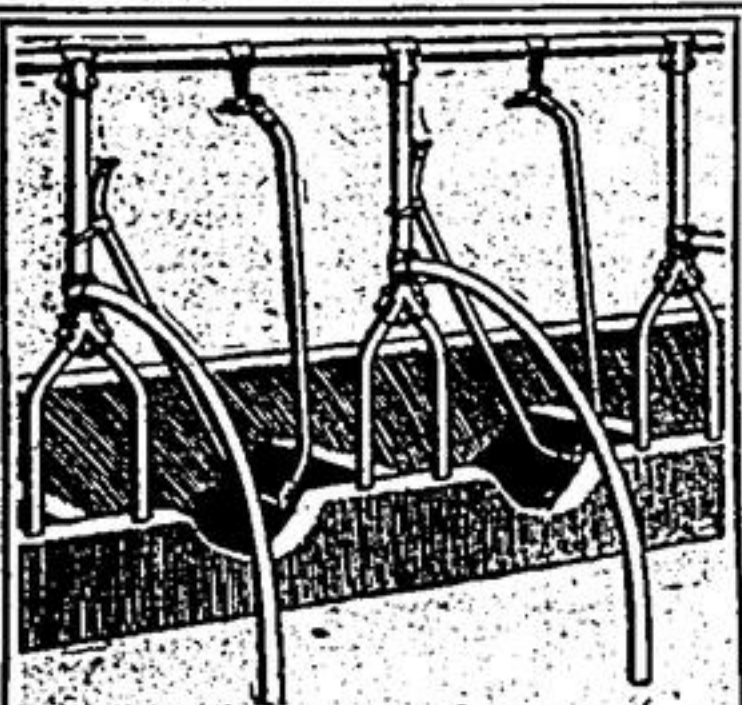

EDITORIAL COMMENT

Just one month until election! Good-Bye blues, to-day's the 24th May!

Frank M. Chapman is the returning officer in South Ontario.

It is expected that Premier Drury will speak in the Music Hall, Uxbridge on Monday, June 4th, at 2 p. m.

J. M. Walton of Aurora has issued a lengthy election address to the electorate of North York.

D. W. Walls is the Conservative candidate in North Ontario, to oppose J. W. Widdfield, the sitting U.F.O. member. The Liberals will not contest the seat.

Rev. Ben Spence has resigned as secretary of the Dominion Alliance. Mr. Spence will become Canadian Secretary of the World League against Alcoholism.

Dr. James Moore of Brooklin is Conservative candidate in South Ontario. This makes a three-corner contest. The U. F. O. running F. H. Richardson of Pickering township, and the Liberals W. E. N. Sinclair of Oshawa.

At a party convention of East York Conservatives held in Toronto on Saturday, Hon. Geo. S. Henry, M.P. P., was unanimously chosen as the candidate for the riding again this election. It looks like a three-cornered fight between the three main political parties.

Harry Clary, the Liberal candidate in East York riding, has been described as living at Agincourt, whereas Mr. Clary lives at Locust Hill, on the 10th of Markham. Last January he contested the Reeveship of Markham against Reeve George Padgett.

A serious attempt is being made in the northwest to reduce the acreage of wheat in order to increase the price. Compared with some of the proposals put forward in Congress for improving the farmer's condition, the plan looks good. It has, however, the serious defect that it will not work. There is no denying the fact that the farmers are not getting their share of the country's prosperity. Farm products have been increasing in price somewhat, but other prices have increased still faster. Including cotton in the price index of agricultural products, the purchasing power of the farm dollar is still under 70 cents. It is considerably less for the farmers who raise the wheat and corn but no cotton. But this great need does not clear the way for the success of an unworkable plan. This is a big country, and it would be impossible to get even a majority of the wheat growers to agree to such a plan, and stick to it. Those who did not agree would be sure to increase their acreage, more than offsetting the production of others.—Wall Street Journal.
