NOTICE OF SITTINGS OF REVISING OFFICER IN THE ELECTORAL DISTRICT OF EAST YORK

Take Notice that sittings of the Revising Officer for the purpose of hearing complaints or appeals with regard to the voters' lists to be used at the election of a member of the Assembly pending for the Electoral District of East York will be held to hear complaints as to the Lists of Voters for the various Municipalities comprised in the said Electoral District, and that His Honour Judge O'Connell will be the Revising Officer.

Sittings will be held for the various Municipalities at the times and places indicated below, and the Clerk of each Municipality (whose name and address below) will act as the Revising Officer's Clerk for all appeals concerning his Municipality, (except in the Township of York) and all such appeals must be filed with the proper Clerk on or before the date appearing in the fifth column below, opposite his name.

Table with columns: Municipality, Place of Sitting, Time and date, Clerk, Last day for Filing Appeals. Rows include LEASIDE, York Township, Markham Township, N. York Township, Markham Village, Stouffville, Richmond Hill, and Scarboro.

Such sittings will commence at the time indicated and will continue until the closing time indicated or until the appeals shall have been disposed of.

And Further Take Notice that any voter who desires to complain that his name, or the name of any person entitled to be entered on said List, has been omitted from the same, or that the names of any persons who are not entitled to be voters have been entered thereon, may on or before the date mentioned in the fifth column above, apply, complain or appeal to have his name or the name of any other person entered on or removed from the List for the Municipality in question.

And Further Take Notice that such appeals must be by Notice in Writing in the Prescribed Form, signed by the complainant in Duplicate, and given to the proper Clerk, or left for him at his address as stated above, on or before the date indicated.

CLEANING STREETS FOR HYDRO

The problem confronting the council at the present time is how to construct the hydro lines along the Main street. A special meeting of the council was called on Monday evening to discuss the problem with the local Independent Telephone Co.

As matters stand, it would be unsafe, although they claim the right, to strip a high power electric line along the Main street on the same side of the road as the telephone wires are on, and for this reason an attempt was made to have both the Bell and Independent Co. occupy the north side and the hydro the south side. At the present time telephone lines are on both sides.

The Independent Company was represented by Messrs. A. D. Bruce, J. H. Ratcliff, Bert Miller and Dr. Sangster. Mr. Bruce explained that the two companies could agree to occupy the north side and the Bell Co. engineer had prepared an estimate of the cost of making the change which would be carried out by the Independent Co. and the town. This estimate for reconstructing the line from O'Brien Avenue to the central office, crossing the street, from Shaw's store corner underground to the main office was estimated at \$676, while the line from Church street to the 10th concession of Markham would cost \$2397.90. The total estimate is therefore \$3074. To offset this estimate the hydro would secure the poles vacated on the south side, most of which could be utilized.

Mr. Bruce admitted that the figures appeared high, but urged the council to have the hydro engineer check them and see where a saving could be effected.

Reeve Morden stated that if the town was expected to pay any sum like \$3074 the proposition might be dropped at once. He thought the municipality would not entertain paying more than half that amount to clear the street for high power electric lines.

It was agreed to submit the estimates to the hydro engineer, and if he fails to come to an agreement as to the proper amount the town should reimburse the telephone co. then the hydro high power lines may be run along the back streets and over private property to the rear with only a low tension line on Main street for lighting purposes.

All parties were agreed however that the finest job would be made by clearing one side of Main street and allowing the hydro a right of way without endangering the lives of parties working on the telephone lines or using the service.

So soon as this matter is settled active work on the hydro construction will commence.
