EDITORIAL COMMENT

WHAT CHANCE HAS MR. COOPER THE U.F.O. CANDIDATE IN NORTH YORK ELECTION

To the Editor of the Tribune.
In 1919 out of a total vote of 11,023 S. P. Foote, G.F.O., received 2,930 or 26 1/2% of the vote. In 1921, out of a total vote of 12,195, R. W. E. Burnaby, U.F.O. received 2,966 or 24% of the vote.
It must be remembered that in these campaigns, Mr. G. A. Brodie, Burnaby and others had organized live clubs in every part of the riding which were in full swing.
Mr. Foote had canvassed and organized; Mr. Burnaby gave practically all his time for two years to picnics, club meetings, canvas and public meetings, and more than that Mr. Burnaby had secured hundreds of subscriptions throughout the riding for shares in the U.F.O. Co-op., and the investors were warm in their support with high hopes of victory at the polls and dividends on their shares.
In those campaigns, agitators from the Labor Temples of the city were brought into the towns to work the vote while the U.F.O. club members rallied the ruralists.
Mr. Foote did not care to repeat the performance. Mr. Burnaby has retired from an official connection with the movement. The Canadian Council of Agriculture, of which he was president has declared itself out of politics.
Mr. Morrison for the U.F.O. has stated that organization does want to sponsor a Government. Hon. Mr. Drury has renounced the U. F. O. label and pinned a People's Party badge on himself. In Hutton, Mr. Burnaby retires gratefully with his investments safely in out of the way and his 1921 campaign expenses thoughtfully paid in advance by the U.F.O. members.
Mr. Cooper courageously sets out to wear down an adverse majority in a four weeks' campaign with all good wishes from Mr. Foote and Mr. Burnaby.

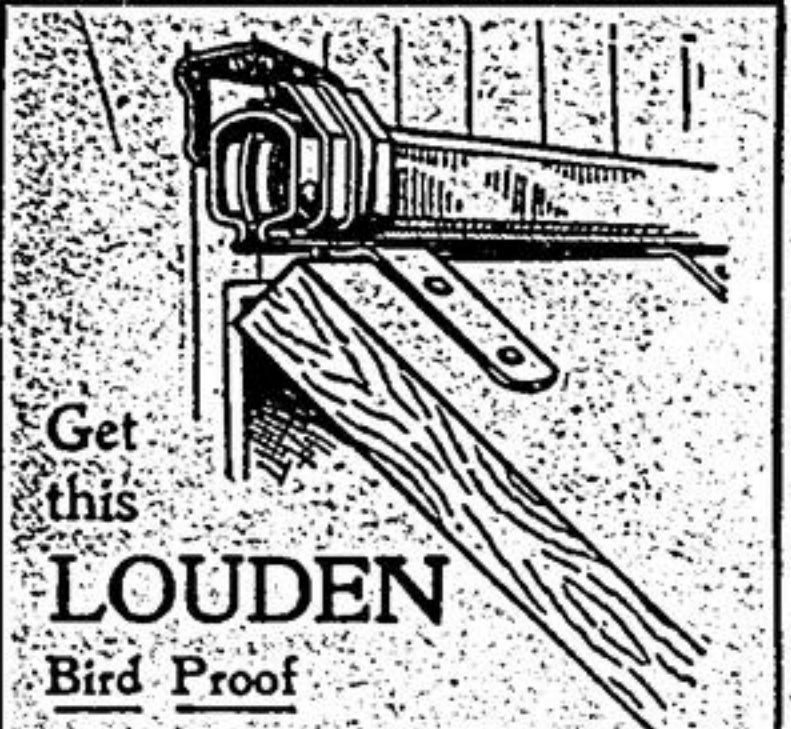
