### NEW TAX COLLECTOR

Council states we haven't Water to Waste.

There was a special meeting of the Town Council on Friday evening chiefly for the purpose of appointing a collector of taxes, the appointment going to Harry Perry, at a salary of \$75.

As usual taxes this year will be collected in two instalments, Sept. 1st and Dec. 1st. The collector is now preparing his tax demands, which should be in the hands of the payees within a few days.

While in session the members discussed the advisability of enforcing a bylaw governing the watering of lawns from the town taps. During the recent dry hot spell the supply of water was perilously low at one time, and had a bad fire occurred at the time, the supply might have been insufficient.

It was also intimated that some people are unnecessarily wasteful of water in the houses, to the extent of allowing a tap to run all night. This sort of practice may lead to unwelcome restrictions being placed on water users.

### THRUSHING STARTED ON RECORD CROPS

As the proof of the pudding is in the eating, so is the thrashing time the real proof of a light or heavy harvest. Last week the threshers started out in the locality of Stouffville to sift the grain from the chaff in the alsike mow. That a heavy yield is the result of this year's growth was manifest after three or four barns had been threshed out. The yield varied all the way from 6 1/2 bushels to the acre to 11 bushels.

Seven and a half bushels to the acre of alsike is regarded here, stated one farmer, as a good yield, but this will not be attained in many sections, on account of the drought. The section about Stouffville was particularly favored with frequent rains. On the farm of Albert E. Booth at the rear of the High school eleven bushels was averaged, while even 13 is reported in some quarters.

Most of the wheat is cut about here, and Robt. Miller's farm at Ringwood is the first to thresh. They started there on Tuesday. This grain is described by Mr. Miller as good sound No. 1 wheat and the yield to the acre will be high.

Some oats are cut and the grain is said to be well filled.

### BOWLING "TOURNEY"

The annual bowling tournament under auspices of the Stouffville club was played yesterday. There were 35 teams in the competition, 5 of which were local. Harry Sanders, Jackson's Point team won first. Almira second, Oshawa third.
