## THE SEA PROVINCES

Continuing from last week our description of the trip of the Weekly Press party through the provinces down by the sea, we leave Halifax by the Canadian National all steel train bound for another delightful tour before turning for home. A short stop was made at Truro, and we are bound for the eastern part of Nova Scotia where the chief place of interest proved to be the Sydneys.

#### The Sydneys

Under the name "The Sydneys" are included three towns: Sydney Mines and North Sydney on the north side of the main harbor, and Sydney on the more protected waters of the Southern arm. The visiting newspaper people were entertained by the British Empire Steel Corporation while in this vicinity and also at New Glasgow.

Some of the party visited the mines but the majority went to the steel plant and coke ovens, saw the iron ore being turned into its constituent parts in the blast furnaces, and then saw the large cubes of red hot metal being pounded and pressed and cut into steel rails, and other smaller pieces being changed into wire and then into wire nails of various kinds and sizes.

After this a short visit to the Cape Breton Yacht Club and then luncheon by the Independent Order of the Daughters of the Empire completed a full program at Sydney.

Before the party left the Sydneys, however, let us say, those members of our party who visited the mines, also had an opportunity to see inside the homes of some of the miners. It was a revelation to the publishers, and according to F. B. Elliott of Alliston, they were finely appointed homes. In some instances player pianos were seen and in one home both a player and gramophone. No sign of poverty or anything of the sort.

#### Lake Voyage

Leaving the Sydneys the party were taken by steamer on the Bras d'Or Lakes which proved a delightful trip. Part of the time was wiled away eating lobsters from the shell and drinking "pop" to wash them down. It was new to most of the party, but everyone entered into the feast good heartedly. We passed the famous home of the late Dr. Alexander Graham Bell, and disembarked at Iona, where our train was waiting.

At New Glasgow the party was given a royal welcome, a luncheon and an auto ride about the country. Next we came to Amherst, N.S., and Sackville, N.B., two border towns. Here we saw dikes, built there many years ago when the French first settled that country, to keep back the tide. Many are still in fair preservation although 150 years old. It is a great country for hay, and the soil is rich. Leaving Sackville we were off for Prince Edward Island, reaching the border that night. The train was taken across Northumberland straits while many of the party slept and, therefore, they did not realize they were on the water. The large ferry which conveyed the train is an immense boat with several tracks so that the large train was broken into sections and loaded in this manner. We landed in half an hour on the island.

#### Prince Edward Island.

The soil is a salmon pink in color and there is said not to be a stone or piece of rock on the entire island. The soil is being continually fertilized with what is known as "mussel mud." This is oysters that have accumulated for centuries and have smothered themselves out in the Atlantic. They are dredged up and hauled home by farmers in immense quantities and spread over the land greatly enriching and fertilizing it. Charlottetown, the capital, is pleasant to the eye and delightful in climatic conditions, and has been aptly described as one of the "most home-like and attractive little cities to be found anywhere." In the central and chief of its five large public squares are located the principle public buildings of the province and Queen Gardens. The city is delightfully situated on the East of Hillsborough River with the York River on its south side. In the days of long ago when French sailors entered the harbor of Charlottetown, they named it Port la Joie.

Somerside, about 48 miles from the capital, is the second to the latter in importance. It has excellent stores, handsome residences, and much to attract the summer visitor. Among its business places is a mail order house whose ramifications extend over the Maritime Provinces and whose turnover runs into several million dollars a year. It is also the centre of the Island's famous fur-farming industry, the headquarters of the Prince Fox Breeders' Association being located there. Somerside fronts on a bay on the south side of the Island, and is delightfully situated. From a hill in the rear of the town a glorious view of the country and of the waters north and south is obtained. In one direction can be seen Bedeque Bay and its attractive surroundings and beyond, Northumberland Strait with the New Brunswick coast line in the distance.

Somerside being the home town of our president, Mr. Brennan, we received a reception unexcelled anywhere on the tour. An auto drive, banquet and other entertainment was provided, which delighted everybody.

AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that such appeals must be by NOTICE IN WRITING IN THE PRESCRIBED FORM, signed by the complainant IN DUPLICATE and given to the Clerk of the Revising Officer or left for him at his address as stated above.

#### INSTRUCTIONS FOR APPEAL

After being filled out the appeals and duplicates must be given to the above named Clerk or left for him at his address as stated above, on or before the 7th day of August, 1923.

If no appeal form can be procured, letters sent to the Clerk of the Revising Officer on or before the 7th August, will be treated as appeal forms, but must contain the full name of the complainant and full particulars as to nationality, age, occupation and length of residence.
