UXBRIDGE TP. COUNCIL

The Council met at Goodwood last Saturday with all members present, the Reeve in the chair.

Geo. E. Todd was elected by acclamation at a nomination meeting held on July 30th to fill a vacancy in the council caused by the resignation of H. Roach as councillor. Mr. Todd being present subscribed to declaration of office and took his seat at the board.

The following communications were then read:

From the Department of Public Highways, statement of amount of subsidy due to township on road expenditure, the amount being \$1,216.86; From Inspector of Prisons and Public Charities, Toronto, re a certain patient admitted there, stating she will be made a charge against the township unless we did in ten days give a satisfactory reason why she should not be; From Mrs. Jos. H. Millard, widow of our late clerk expressing thanks for kindness of Council in resolution and letter of condolence passed by same and also for wreath for funeral of her late husband; From Hydro Electric Commission, agreement form and asking council to pass bylaw for same (laid over for further consideration and investigation on resolution of Mr. Catherwood and Mr. Cassie); From Toronto General Hospital bill of \$22.50 for maintenance of Elizabeth Gregory while inmate of same.

Mr. Todd seconded by Mr. Lee moves that the clerk write the Hospital authorities that Miss Gregory was not a resident of this township and we decline to pay said bill. Carried.

Mr. Wood of the Department of Public Highways, Toronto, waited on the council, and gave them some valuable advice and assistance regarding the keeping and rendering the accounts of cash expenditure on roads in the township in connection with the Government subsidy on same.

The tender of J. W. Gould, for building a cement culvert on Uxbridge and Scott townline for \$325 was presented to council, said tender has been accepted by the commissioners of each township.

Mr. Smalley, treasurer, presented his semi-annual report of receipts and expenditures for the half year which was adopted on motion of Mr. Cassie and Mr. Lee.

On motion of Mr. Todd and Mr. Cassie the clerk was instructed to have 10 cards printed, giving a schedule of rates of rent to parties using town hall.

Mr. Catherwood seconded by Mr. Cassie that the clerk be instructed to write Robert Stewart that any parties moving a threshing machine across Sandy Hook bridge must plank same before doing so. Carried.

Mr. Cassie seconded by Mr. Todd moves for leave to introduce a bylaw to provide for levying the tax rate for the current year and that the same be now read a first and second time and the council go into committee of the whole thereon. Carried.
