### EDITORIAL COMMENT

Man is known by the company he keeps, woman by the company she keeps waiting.

Lieut. Col. Harry Cameron is mentioned as a likely person to be appointed as the central Ontario representative on the Hydro Electric Power Commission of Ontario. As a personal friend of Col. Cameron this paper would welcome his presence on the Board. We feel sure that he would uphold the rights of smaller municipalities. Hydro is no longer a cheap power to many small towns.

It will be news to many people to learn that the dead letter office is practically self-sustaining. The revenues received from mis-directed letters containing money enclosures being sufficient to pay all the expenses of the large staff permanently engaged in the endeavor to find correct addresses for the upwards of 3,000 letters which are received daily.

As an evidence of what some people go to church for, we cite a case from Washington. The regular Sunday attendance at the Calvary Baptist church has fallen off considerably. That was where the Hardings worshipped. President Coolidge, however, goes to the First Congregational church, and the trustees have had to buy extra chairs to take care of the crowd. Washingtonians never get tired of looking at the President, regardless of who he is.

### CANNINGTON DEPOSITORS DREW THEIR MONEY

In Cannington and Sunderland there was a whisper about the Home Bank failure before it really occurred. The day before the bank closed its doors the depositors in the Cannington branch of the Home Bank began to clamor for their money. Two inspectors were rushed up from the head office with enough currency to meet all calls. Cannington is eight miles from Sunderland. The inspectors who brought up the currency from head office reached Cannington on Friday morning, August 17th. The inspector stopped the run at Cannington and told Manager Purvis of Sunderland that the Home Bank was never in finer condition.

The next news that Mr. Purvis received from head office was dated Friday, August 17th. That news was written in the form of an order to close the doors of the Sunderland Branch of the Home Bank and put up a notice that payment was suspended up to the legal limit of ninety days. Mr. Purvis at once started for Toronto in his motor car and phoned back at midnight that he has been unable to get in touch with officials at the head office. Sunderland never subscribed for stock in the Home Bank which opened its branch in Sunderland on January 18th, 1909. At that time the total deposits in Sunderland and district on savings and current account were estimated at \$400,000. The aggregate deposits were greatly reduced by competition from Victory bonds. Farmers and villagers took their money out of savings accounts and put their savings into Victory bonds. The best guess is that deposits on savings account did not total more than \$100,000 when the bank closed its doors.

### IMAGINE THIS OCCURRING IN STOUFFVILLE

Are school inspectors supposed to turn the young lady school teacher over their knees and spank them? Are there printed rules and regulations to this effect or are inspectors supposed to use their own discretion?
