### EDITORIAL COMMENT

In time some men may get used to women smoking, but when it comes to chewing—here's hoping they stick to the rag.

The Standard Bank of Canada with branch office in Stouffville has purchased \$3,500,000 worth of Dominion of Canada bonds, as an investment. This looks like sound business.

The rapid increase of divorces in the United States is causing serious concern, and a movement has been inaugurated to try to get at the root of the evil and to save the nation from moral catastrophe. At present about 160,000 decrees of divorce are issued annually, and the rate of divorce is said to be increasing three times as fast as the population.

Under the Consolidated Municipal Act of 1922, a township council may pass a bylaw for granting a prize not exceeding \$10 for the best kept roadside, farm front and farm house surroundings in each public school section. It seems to us some of the township councils around Stouffville should take advantage of this act, and thus encourage the ratepayers to beautify their surroundings which would be to their own advantage. Here's something for new candidates to come out on. They might meet with defeat, but they would at least have introduced something new in municipal elections.

There are 600 students in attendance at Toronto Normal School, about double the number there is adequate accommodation for, and five additional teachers are required to instruct the extra students in the art of teaching. The other Normals are filled to capacity too. All of which goes to show that the higher salaries are attracting the young men and the young women to the teaching profession. In war times teachers' salaries were doubled in many instances and the young men were almost eliminated from the profession. With the increasing number of teachers it does look as though salaries had reached the high-water mark and it may mean a reduction in some instances despite the Federation's regulations.
