COUNTY ROAD WORK

Nearly \$400,000 has been spent by York County this year on the roads, the York County Roads Commission reporting.

All jobs completed with the exception of one. This vast sum of money was spent in various parts of the county. A big improvement will be noticed motoring to Toronto by the Kennedy road.

At Milliken the water-bound macadam road laid in 1912 has been widened, strengthened and topped with a bituminous pavement, and at the 8th concession of Whitchurch a deviation has been built around a swamp bridge, which overcame a trouble that had faced the road officials for nearly 30 years.

Throughout the county some 80 culverts had been built during the year, varying in size from 18 inches to 10 feet.
