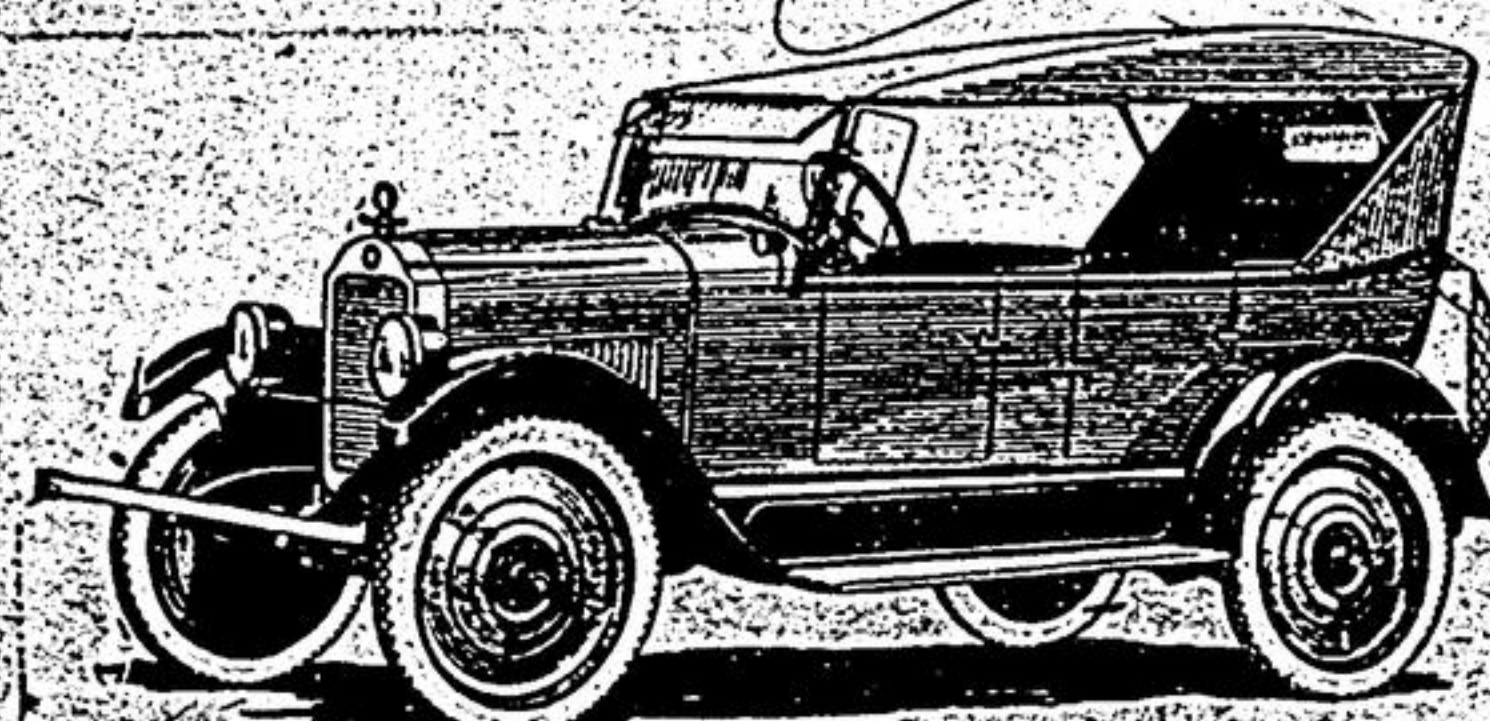

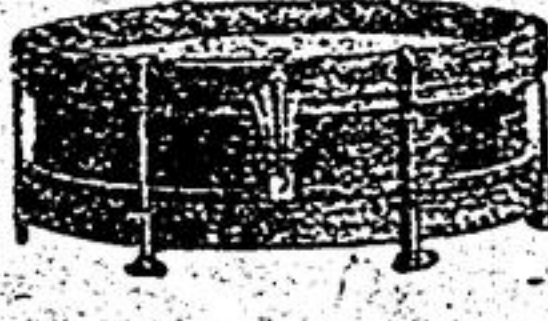
MILK

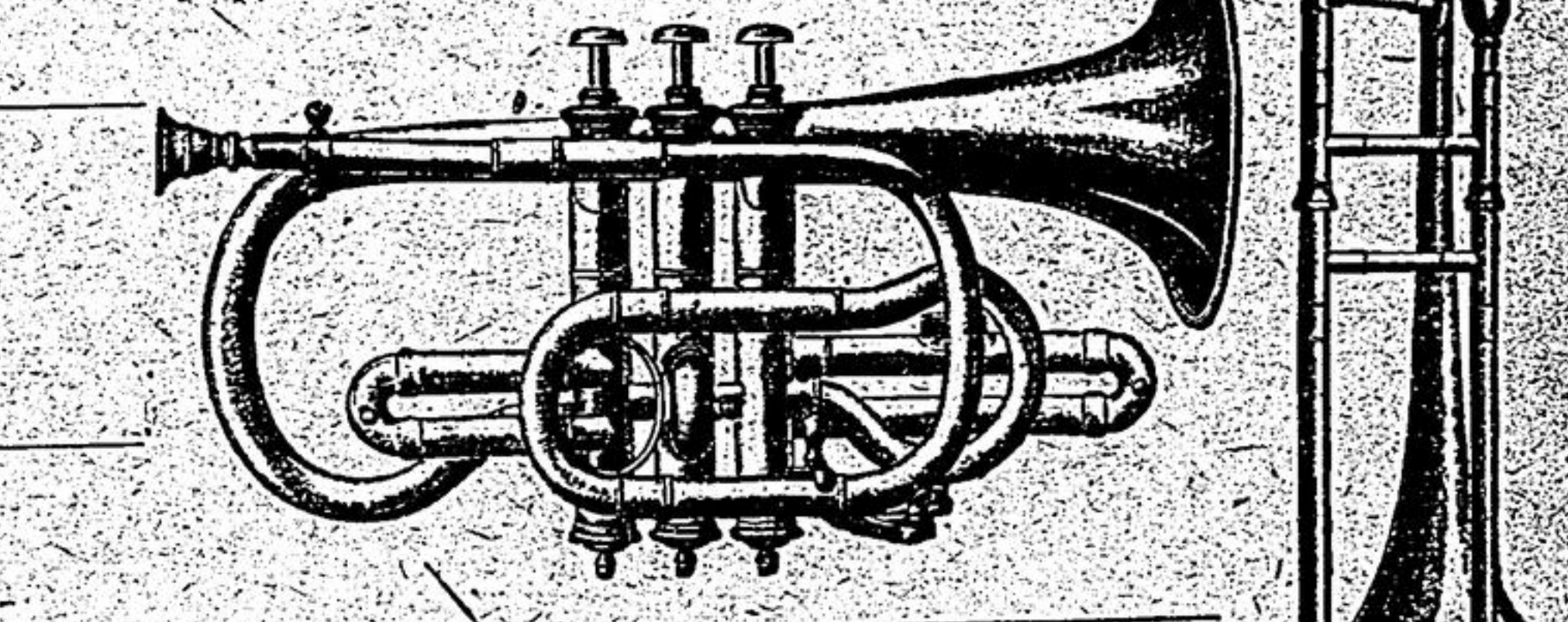

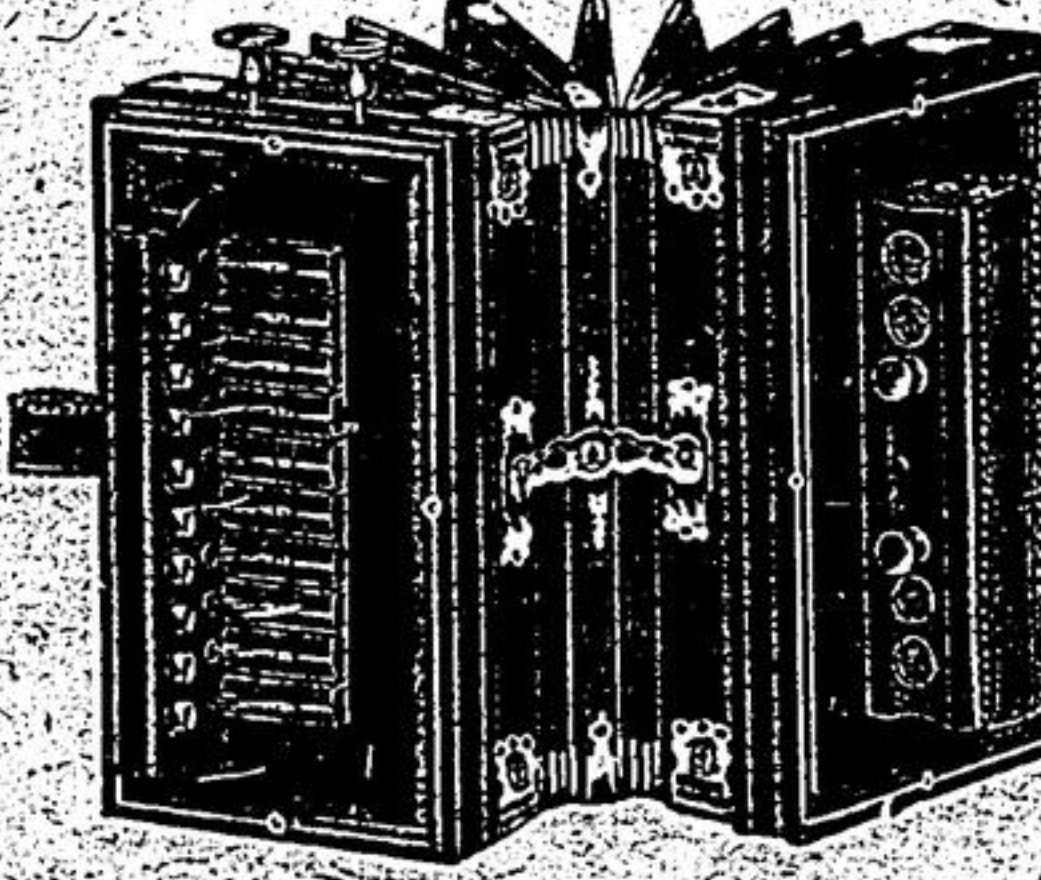
