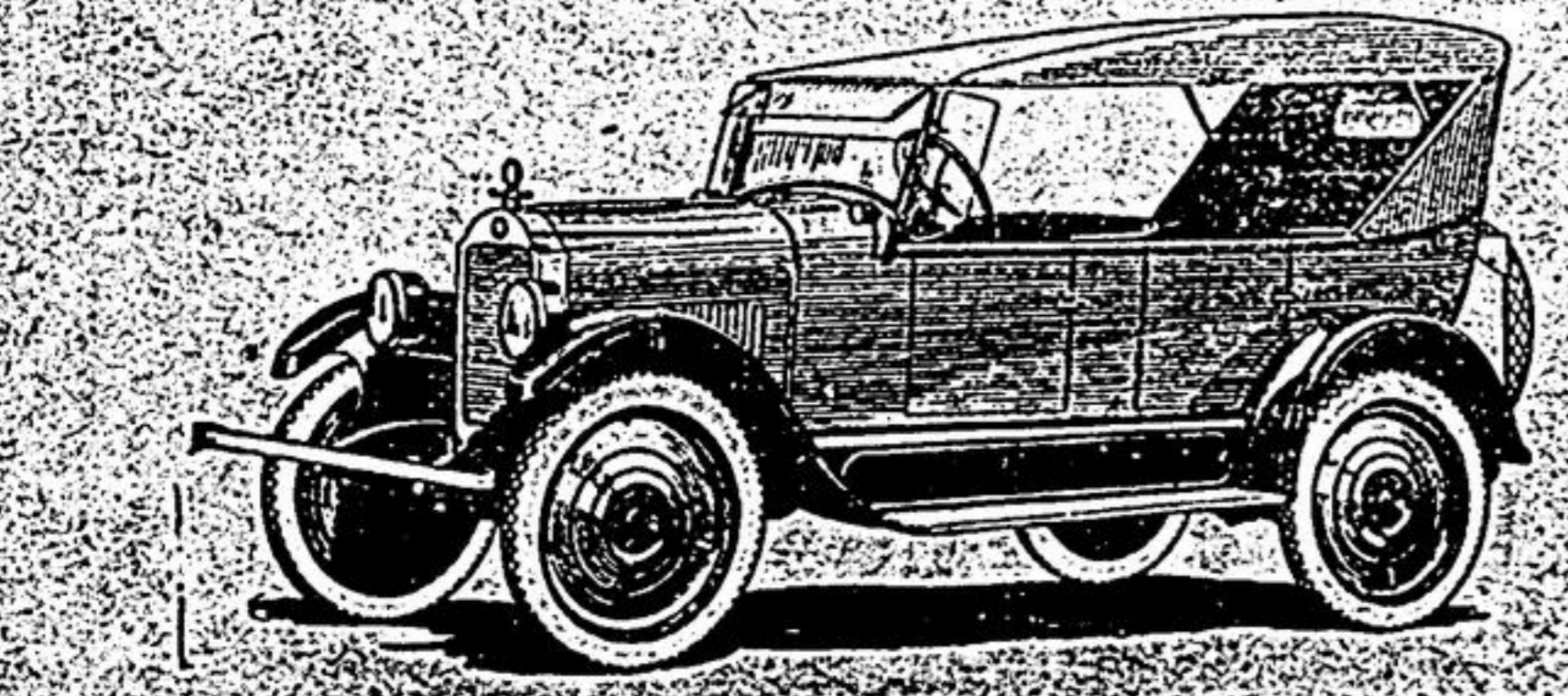

**Cancelled Taxes of Fire Sufferers**  
The council met at Goodwood on Saturday with all the members present, the reeve in the chair.  
The minutes of last meeting were read and on motion of Messrs. Cassie and Lee adopted.  
The following communications were read:  
Application of J. J. St. John re hydro power; the committees re townline adjustments gave their reports and on motion of Mr. Catherwood and Cassie was adopted; the A.O.H. report for 1923 was read and on motion of Catherwood and Todd adopted; the School attendance officer's report was read and on motion of Todd and Cassie adopted; the annual report of the Board of Health was read and on motion of councillors Catherwood and Cassie adopted; the Rev. Mr. Otten waited on the council asking to be relieved of the dog tax on his bill as the dog belonged to his predecessor, Rev. Mr. Lane, allowed; Geo. Coates of south townline, also waited on council concerning the road in front of his residence re changing of water-course and also culvert in approach to his gateway. Council decided to have an investigation made; Fred Jackson, asked the council for some relief on taxes as he had suffered a loss by fire, the council discussed the matter of Mr. Jackson and also Mr. E. Wagg, who had suffered a great loss by fire, and on motion of Councillors Todd and Catherwood, their taxes with the exception of school taxes were cancelled.  
Councillors Lee and Cassie, moves that E.W. Davis be appointed school attendance officer for 1924. Carried.  
Councillors Todd and Catherwood moves that the clerk be authorized to sign the application of J. J. St. John for rural electric service. Carried.  
Councillors Catherwood and Cassie moves for leave to introduce a by-law to provide for the contingent of the corporation for the year 1923.  
The bylaw was given its several readings and passed.  
A large number of accounts were paid which will appear in the financial statement.  
Council adjourned sine die.

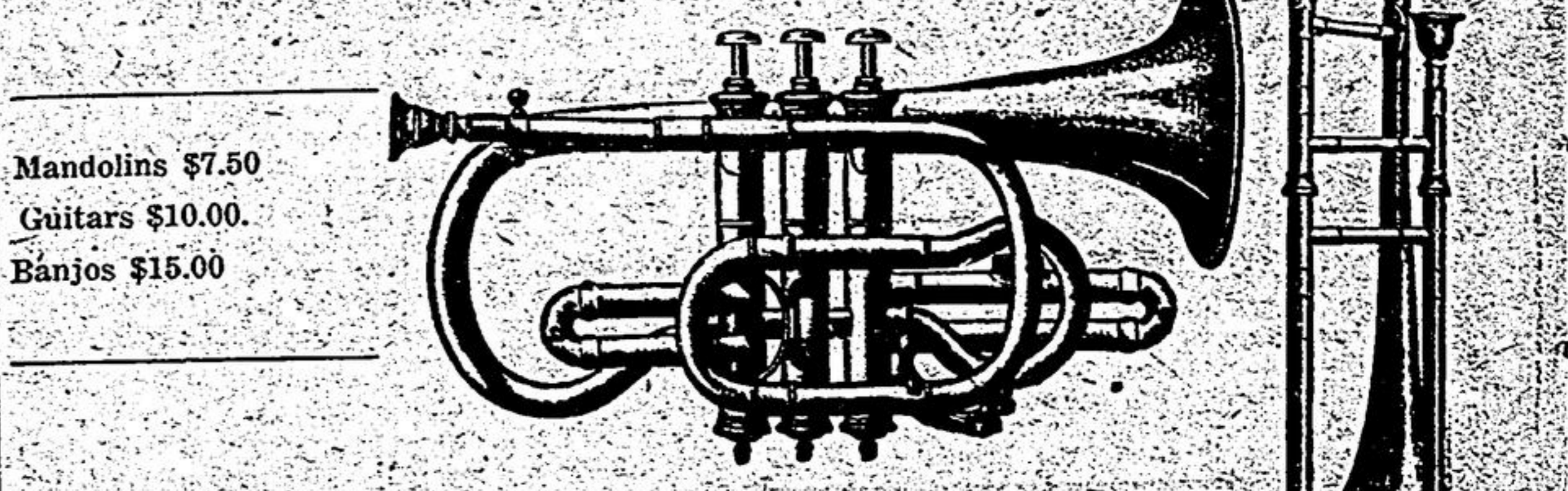
