On motion council adjourned "sine die".

MARKHAM TOWNSHIP COUNCIL Council met at Unionville on Dec. 15th to straighten up the year's affairs. All the members were present and Reeve Padgett in the chair. The Hospital for Sick Children wrote requesting a grant. Mr. Rogers, county representative of the Ontario Department of Agriculture, was heard asking for a grant to help pay rent expenses in conducting a Junior Farmers' short course at Richmond Hill, and received a favorable promise. The tax collectors were given until February 1st to finish collecting. Grants to public libraries were made as follows:—Unionville, \$20, Thornhill \$15, Markham \$15 and Richmond Hill \$10. The Reeve reported that he had arranged with the Provincial Highways Department which had recommended to the Government that Markham be given 800 yards of gravel (80 car loads) delivered at convenient sidings as recompense for damage done to roads in Markham by defouring the past summer. M. and John Allen of lot 11, con. 5, have complained of water lying on their farm and wanted the council to take it off, but the council had no power to do so and notified Mr. Allen that the only way he could force the issue was to call in the township engineer under the Ditches and Watercourses Act. This Mr. Allen did recently and the engineer made an award which was going to be very expensive to carry out. Another plan was thought of much less expensive, that was to carry the water along off Mr. Allen's farm along a ditch for a short way on the roadside and though H. P. Eckhardt's farm on the 5th by way of an open ditch. The parties got together at the council meeting and all being agreed the matter was settled, the council passed this resolution:— "That the Township Engineer's report to the clerk as to the possibilities of arranging water course on lot 11, con. 5, and on the clerk reporting to the township and approval being received action be taken as soon as possible by the municipality, and the Reeve and deputy-reeve be commissioners, amount, if any, payable on their order." A resolution was passed to pay salaries and commissions of councillors as provided by bylaw. The treasurer submitted the financial statement before having same printed.
