MARKHAM TOWNSHIP COUNCIL

Council met at Unionville on Dec. 15th to straighten up the year's affairs. All the members were present and Reeve Padgett in the chair.

The Hospital for Sick Children wrote requesting a grant.

Mr. Rogers, county representative of the Ontario Department of Agriculture, was heard asking for a grant to help pay rent expenses in conducting a junior farmers' short course at Richmond Hill, and received a favorable promise.

The tax collectors were given until February 1st to finish collecting.

Grants to public libraries were made as follows: Unionville \$20. Thornhill \$15. Markham \$15 and Richmond Hill \$10.

The reeve reported that he had arranged with the Provincial Highways Department which had recommended to the Government that Markham be given 800 yards of gravel (80 car loads) delivered at convenient sidings as recompense for damage done to roads in Markham by detouring the past summer.
