COL. FAREWELL DEAD

Lieutenant-Colonel John Edwin Farewell, K.C. who died in the Oshawa General Hospital Saturday afternoon, was County Crown Attorney and Clerk of the Peace for Ontario County since 1872. The late Colonel Farewell was born in East Whitby in 1840. He was the adopted son of the late Abraham Farewell who was member of Parliament for South Ontario following the Sandfield-Macdonald administration.

A 10 PER CENT DIVIDEND

The annual meeting of the King George Hotel Co., Newmarket, took place in the Commercial rooms last week at which 37 out of the 152 shares were represented. Capt. Aubrey Davis acted as chairman. Mr. A. E. Bogart presented the financial statement and the report of the Directors. This report shows that the expenses of the hotel mounted higher every year. The taxes in 1910 were \$90 while this year they are about \$700. Water in 1910 cost \$18 and in 1923 nearly \$100. Light this year cost \$188 and ice \$139. The repairs and replacements cost just \$372.99, showing that the plant is kept up to the standard. The directors recommend a dividend of 7 per cent the same as last year and a bonus of 3 per cent the same as last year and a bonus to Mr. and Mrs. Brown of \$500 in addition to their salary.
