HOG GRADES.
Returns on the grades of hogs shipped from York county, still show an average of 37 to 38% selects and 50% thick smooth, with a surprising large number of shops and heaves. For the two weeks ending December 19th, the shipments from Pefferlaw and Mount Albert, averaged the best, and Sutton and Brown Hill at the other end of the list. The hogs from the southern points which are trucked, in are grading considerably better than the car lots. Of the 47 hogs trucked to Gunns, 35 (74%) graded selects, and a load of 12 Yorkshires from Markham to Davies grading 100% selects holds a record that cannot be beaten. The term thick smooth has been puzzling many of the producers. Hogs of good bacon type and weight which are lacking finish are graded thick smooths, to give the farmer the best possible price.

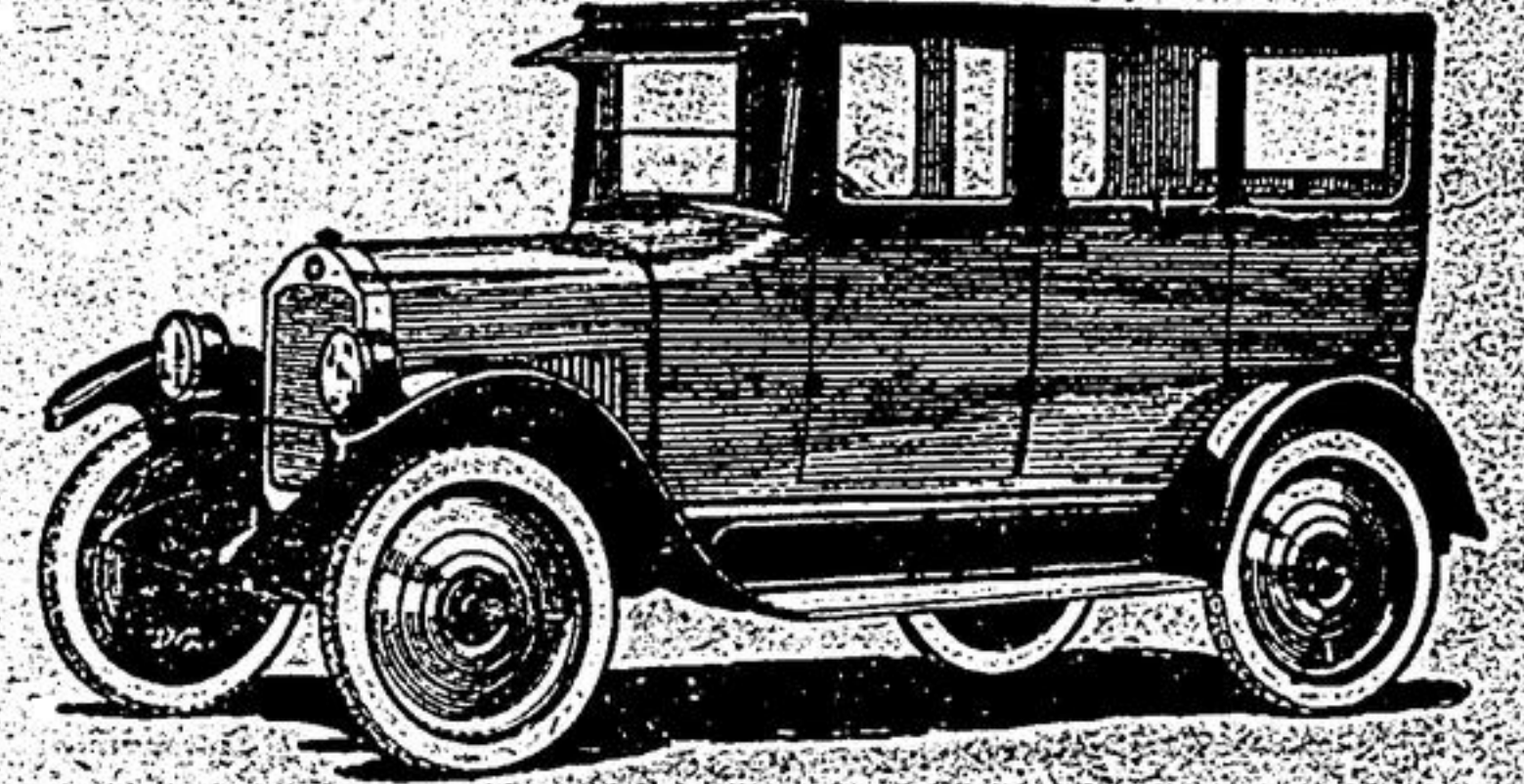
