### Band Concert, (tonight, Thursday)

Cultivator Points at B.E. Beebe's shop.

Local farmers were offering maple syrup for sale on the market last Thursday, the first run of the season which is claimed to be the best.

During the year 1923 the Stouffville Creamery shipped from the factory here 361,000 pounds of butter, which represents a turnover in cash of an amount far exceeding \$100,000. The company has just purchased a new Ruggles truck of one and a half ton capacity which they will use to still further increase their business during the current year. This additional equipment will enable them to cover more ground in gathering cream.

There is no one longing for warm weather more than Casper Stover, but then he has a greater cause than most boys. Casper, after being clad in a real warm overcoat all winter, is now minus that still necessary wrap. A tramp who took refuge for the night in the rear of the Mansion House, having been shown where he might sleep by benevolent boys, last Friday night, departed very early in the morning and took with him Casper's coat which hung on the wall. As the Knight of the Road didn't leave his route card or any other clue to his immediate whereabouts, any attempt to locate him was futile.

Stouffville council have been requested to pass a resolution to be forwarded to Ottawa praying the officials of the C.N.R. to operate a gas car between Toronto, Stouffville and Sutton. The idea was sprung in Markham council and that body have circulated all the communities along the line. Although Whit church council saw fit to petition the company along this line, Stouffville council did not favor such action. It was felt around the board that Stouffville enjoys an excellent train service all the year through, in fact all that the traffic warrants, and to harass the officials or induce them into a proposition that may be a money loser for the road, is not true patriotism. No doubt the council's patriotism is not far wrong, and we believe that the C.N.R. officials will be quick to operate a car on this line so soon as they feel that such a change would make money for the Canadian National.

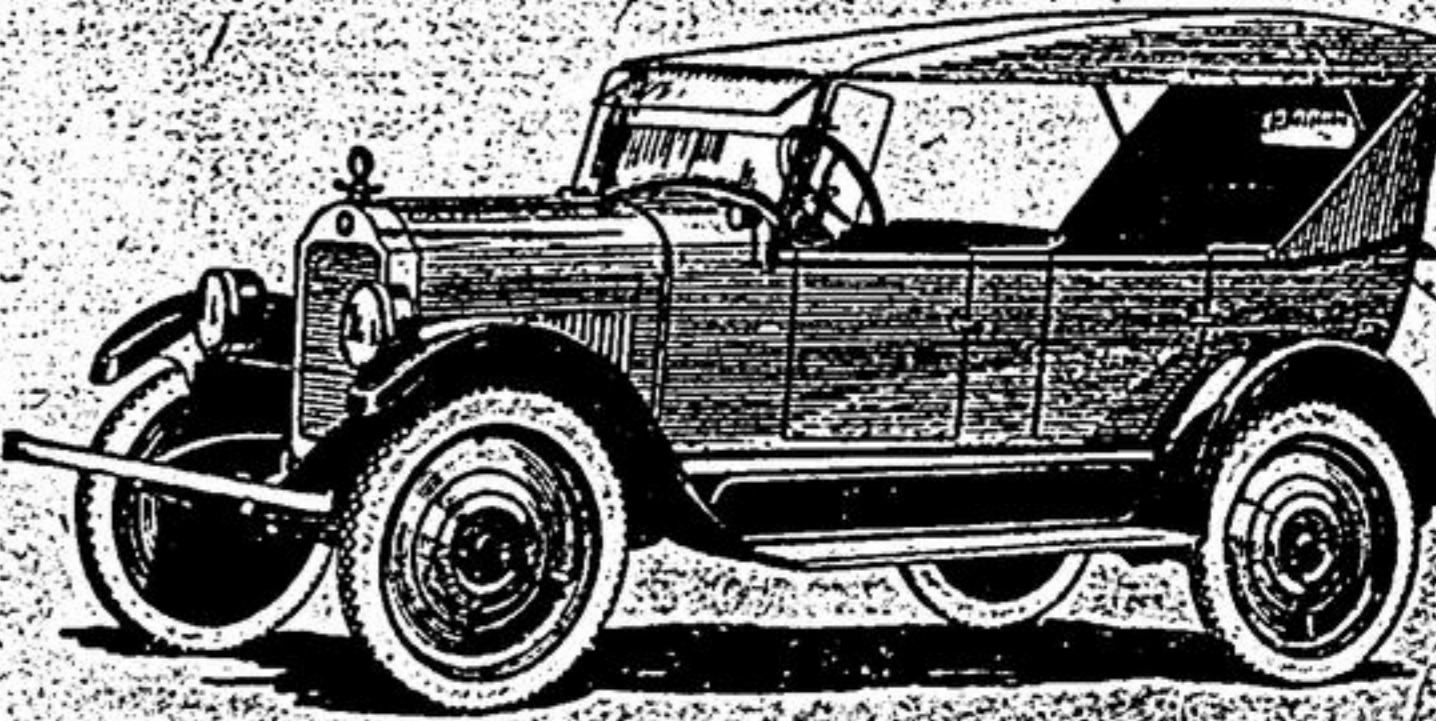
