However, a number of persons came in later from other meetings, including half a dozen women.

Dr. Dales was asked to take the chair, and after preliminary remarks the election of officers was proceeded with, and this having been accomplished an adjournment was made.

The advantages and objects of a Horticultural Society have been pointed out in these columns before, and we hope during the coming summer to see wonderful improvement along our streets in the way of more flowers, beds and well kept lawns and boulevards. HON. PETER SMITH ARRESTED MONDAY

Hon. Peter Smith, for about four years, treasurer of the Province of Ontario, in the Drury Government, was formally placed under arrest early Monday afternoon on a charge of having conspired with A. H. Peppal to defraud the Government by taking secret commissions on the purchase of succession duty free bonds.

Bail of \$50,000 was required for his release.

Monday morning, he had left his apartments at the King Edward and visited H. H. Dewart, K.C., and got his advice to appear before the committee and testify without asking for protection. But after reaching the Parliament buildings, he learned of certain proceedings under way, and Mr. Dewart then counselled him not to make a statement.

During the morning, he had sat impassively smoking his pipe while Albert Nash, accountant, had laid bare details concerning Smith's bank deposit, and the frequency of deposits of \$500 and \$1,000 bills, and McHattie, manager of the bank, had confirmed details.

Peter Smith, who is 46 years of age, was a farmer and stockbreeder in Perth county before he became Provincial Treasurer. He had been a township councillor and township clerk. When the 1919 provincial elections approached, he accepted the Liberal nomination, which latter was merged with a U.F.O. nomination, and when the Drury Government was formed he became Treasurer, in November, 1919. After his accession to the Cabinet he gave up the farm and moved into Stratford.

"Andy" Peppal, who is named in the conspiracy charge with Smith, was formerly associated with Smith in a Delco lighting agency. When Smith became Treasurer, Peppal went to his brother, in the Jarvis firm, and brought the Jarvis firm and Smith together later accompanied Aemilius Jarvis to England as a representative of Peter Smith in regard to the purchase of succession duty free bonds. For this trip, Peppal was paid \$4,000 as expenses. Peppal is now in a glass manufacturing business at Los Angeles, Cal.

STOUFFVILLE TO BE MADE A CENTRE

Last year Uxbridge derived a revenue of \$8,000 from the Infants Home, Toronto, for boarded out children. As a result of publicity given by the Tribune, Stouffville is also to be made a centre for these little ones, with similar financial returns coming to the people in this district.

The Infants Home is largely supported by generous people in Toronto, and the applicants in Stouffville who take care of one or two children, are very well paid for their trouble, while they also render a great service to the poor little babies, on which the home has taken compassion.

Miss Jessie Allan, nurse in charge of the Uxbridge centre, has sent the Tribune the following letter:

"I have to thank you for your great kindness in granting me so much space in your paper in connection with advertisement for the placing-out of children in Stouffville."

Most applications came from Stouffville, so a centre will probably be opened there shortly, but at the present time, the Board of the Infants Home are short of funds, and I have been advised not to take any steps until further notice."

UXBRIDGE TWP. COUNCIL

Two Sections will erect new School Buildings

The council met at Goodwood on Saturday, April 12th, with the members all present and the Reeve in the chair. The minutes of the last meeting were read and on motion confirmed, and signed by the Reeve and Clerk.

The following communications were read:

From Ontario Department of Public Highways stating that no grants will be paid to any township on road expenditure carried out after Dec. 31st, 1924, that has retained statute labor, which means that in order to qualify for the government subsidy, the statute labor system will have to be abolished and all road improvements supervised by a proper road superintendent. Annual report of Department of Agriculture and from several road building machinery.

From A. E. James, sec. treas. S.S. No. 2, stating that at a special meeting of ratepayers of above section, a vote was taken re C. Manley's property being transferred to S.S. No. 5 six votes for and 34 against.

From W. O. Webster, clerk of Scott township re agreement North Township.

Isaac Hare waited on the council requesting something to be done to sideling between lots 10 and 11.

An application of the School Trustees of S.S. No. 4, was presented asking council to issue debentures to raise the sum of \$7000 to buy a site, build and equip a school for said section, same to be payable in 10 equal annual installments. The same was also received from S.S. No. 2 for \$6000 repayable in 10 equal installments.

The Rev. Mr. Otten came before the council with a petition that will be forwarded to the Railway Department, Ottawa, asking that the early morning train, known as the "flier" may be stopped at Goodwood on its return trip from Toronto in the evening, as it would be a great convenience to the surrounding district. The petition was signed by each official present.

Mr. Wideman complained of a culvert on West T. L. stating same was not low enough to carry the water off property.

Councillors Glaspell and Lee moved that the school attendance officers report for March be adopted. Carried.

Councillors Glaspell and Lee moved that in accordance with the applications of the school boards of S.S. No. 4 and No. 2, Township of Uxbridge for the issue of debentures for the purpose of building and equipping school buildings, and for site, etc. that the clerk be instructed to have in due course bylaws and debenture forms prepared for same. Carried.

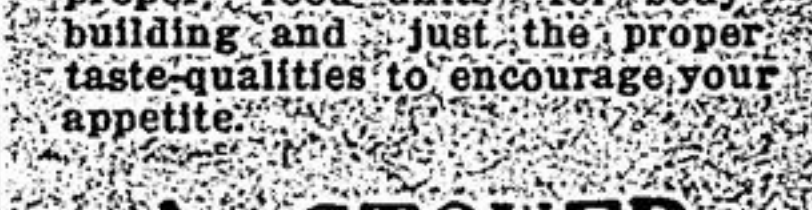
