MYSTERIOUS DEATH OF LITTLE CHILD

A most unusual death occurred of a two-year-old boy at Unionville on Monday afternoon, when the little fellow supposedly in a sleep but actually dead, was carried into the home of Mr. Frank Frisby from a limousine and left there, while a friend of Mrs. Frisby and another lady continued on to Stouffville, where one of the occupants was receiving treatment from Dr. Freed. In the car which came from Toronto was Mrs. Whitfield and her sister, who were friends of the Frisby's also a Miss Quantrell, and the child. On reaching Unionville it was decided to leave the little fellow with Mrs. Frisby, who came out to the car to greet the guests. The boy was handed over to her, to all appearances asleep, but Mrs. Frisby informs the Tribune that she realized later the child was dead. She remarked that he looked very pale and was in such a heavy sleep, but was told that he was in perfect health. One of Mrs. Whitfield's remained at Unionville. Becoming alarmed after the other ladies left for Stouffville, at the child's awful stillness and pale face, the women called in a doctor who pronounced the little fellow dead. The body was taken to Toronto.

MARKHAM DIVISION COURT

Judge O'Connell presided at the sitting of the division court in Markham village on Monday last week. There were only two unsettled cases on the docket.

The first was the claim of W. J. Thompson vs. Wm. Bassett. This was for a note of \$200 and interest since maturity on the 9th of February. The original note had been for \$225, and this had been renewed for \$200 when it became due on Nov. 6. The defendant claimed that the reason he had not paid this note on maturity was that it was given for two Shorthorn cows and a heifer, and that the cows were in calf when purchased and that the plaintiff was to have the progeny recorded. This he had not done when the note fell due but had done so since and he had offered to settle but objected to paying costs. The plaintiff admitted that he had agreed to record the calves but said that this was impossible until he secured the particulars from the defendant which were not furnished until Feb. 13th, when he had immediately sent the papers to Ottawa. It was the defendant's own fault that they were not recorded sooner. Judgment for plaintiff for note and interest and costs.

Levi Hoover of Stouffville sued W. S. Sandler of Brooklyn \$60.05 on a note given for a span of horses. The defendant did not appear and judgment was given for amount of note, \$57.00 and interest to date.

5000 MENNONITES WILL COME TO CANADA THIS SUMMER

During the coming summer some 5,000 Russian Mennonites will come to Canada and will settle in Waterloo, Lincoln and York Counties. The Mennonites are a thrifty people and if they conform to Canadian laws will make good citizens. They have expressed a willingness to become good Canadian citizens. The C.P.R. is taking them from the Baltic ports and will transport them to Montreal for \$140 a head, and the money need not be paid for two years, each signing a note to that effect on landing at Montreal. Twenty years ago a batch were brought out on similar conditions and not one of them defaulted. These so-called Russian Mennonites left Germany about 1740 and settled in Russia. They prospered, only to have their estates seized by the Soviets in 1917, and many were left destitute. The Russian Government is favorable to their leaving the country to which they must never return.

\$180,000 FOR NEW COUNTY ROADS

Abundant Help at 32c hour

Expenditure on county roads this summer totalling approximately \$180,000 was sanctioned by the Toronto and York Road Commission last week, and tenders opened and awarded for the work. The bidding from the different contractors, was close, and the lowest tender in each case was accepted. Engineer E. A. James stated that the contractors would be instructed not to start work until the first week in May, and have it completed by the middle of July.

The work to be done for which tenders were awarded, and the successful bidders were: Scarlett road, Construction Paving Company; Brown's Line, A. E. Jupp Co.; York road, Law Construction Co.; Kennedy road, A. E. Jupp Co.; Sutton road at Keswick, Warren Bituminous Paving Co.; Weston road at Nobleton, E. S. Dagg, of Nashville. The commissioners pointed out that although this large amount of work is to be done, since the laborers of the county are willing to accept 32 cents per hour, there is little chance of it helping the unemployment situation in Toronto, where the laborers expect 60 cents per hour.

SILVER CHALLENGE CUPS FOR YORK COUNTY

Baseball and Lacrosse Teams

York Pioneer and Historical Society make generous offer.

At its April meeting this energetic Society, through its President, Jas. L. Hughes, decided to secure two Silver Challenge Cups for competition among baseball and lacrosse teams in York County which are not competing for district or higher championships—the details being left in the hands of a small sub-committee.

The first games in these competitions must be played at York Pioneers Park, Sharon, on Saturday, June 7th, when the Society pays its annual visit to the Historic Temple and park.

On that date there will be two meetings, one in the afternoon and another in the evening. At the latter, the 40 windows of this famous old building will be illuminated with scores of candles in honor of the builder of the Temple, David Wilson, the anniversary of whose birth falls on June 7th. Very fine programs of addresses, and music are being arranged for these gatherings, which will no doubt be attended by record crowds.

The Sharon Athletic Club has organized for 1924 with nearly 50 members. The park is to be enlarged to 8 acres. A good tennis court is being built and the grounds put in fine shape for baseball, lacrosse, football, and other games.
