Toronto exhibition opens on Saturday. With our own citizen Mr. Robt. Miller, as President, the big fair has a closer relationship to Stouffville than being 'Canada's National Exhibition', and when we visit the grounds we feel we have an intimacy with the 'commander-in-chief' which adds interest and delight for the visitors who go from this section.

Melville church on the 6th line of Markham, which has been closed for redecoration purposes, will be reopened on Sunday next, at 2.15 p.m. when the Rev. G. R. Duncan of Montreal, will be the preacher. Mr. Duncan will also take the morning service in the Stouffville Presbyterian church at 11 a.m., to give the pastor an opportunity to conduct the service at Musselman's Lake at 10 a.m.

A baptismal service under auspices of the local Mennonite church was held by the waterside at Altona on Sunday afternoon, in charge of the pastor Rev. W. M. McGuire. It is significant of the work of the pastor that including the number of candidates on this occasion it marked the eighty-fourth to be immersed since his pastorate commenced here three years ago. At Sunday's service a large number of people gathered at the appointed place, the pastor read portions of scripture, spoke a few words of admonition, and the assembly entered heartily into the singing of hymns. Six candidates were immersed, after answering in the affirmative the following questions:

- 1. Can you testify that you through repentance towards God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, have experienced the forgiveness of your sins, and enjoy peace with God?
2. Are you willing to renounce the world, with all sinful gratifications and cleave unto the Lord, and consecrate your all to His service?
3. Are you willing to be taught from the Word of God, and to yield obedience to all that He enjoins upon you?

Stouffville failed to send a baseball team to Barrie on Monday of last week as originally intended. Four teams entered the tournament, being Barrie, Hillsdale, Mansfield and Thornbury, with the Barrie team winning the prize. The Advance has the following to say regarding the success of the celebration financially, and we reproduce it to show that Stouffville is not the only place where it costs a lot of money to put on a right celebration: 'There were four hundred and fifty-seven paid admissions to the dance. The day was a success financially and otherwise. The receipts from all sources are at least \$1050, and the expenditures, though not accurately known, will take about \$500. This leaves a surplus of \$250 which the B.A.A.A. proposes to use financing Barrie hockey, football, and junior baseball teams. The expenses in connection with the celebration seem unusually large at first sight, but it cost \$240 to bring the Collingwood-Kitties band here, and the Collegiate band, increased the appropriation for music to \$300. The prizes took another \$300, and advertising was a \$125 item. Besides these, large items, there were various incidentals which would easily amount to \$75. The war tax alone is \$60. Now who says it costs nothing to celebrate?'

Many Stouffville people will remember L. C. Fletcher, a former assistant pastor of the Stouffville Christian church. On the Monday of this week he was married at New Britain, U.S.A., and the Hartford Daily Courier has this to say respecting the event: 'A wedding of church folk, the parallel of which has seldom, if ever, occurred, will take place Monday afternoon, when Rev. Llewellyn C. Fletcher of LaGrangeville, N.Y., and Miss Anna A. King, New Britain, deaconess for three years at the Grace Methodist church New Haven, will be married. The wedding of the couple marks the culmination of a college romance, which started two years ago at Yale University. Miss King, who is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John King of Deep River, has been studying at the Yale Divinity School and in addition to her studies, she engaged in practical church work at Grace Methodist church, being appointed a deaconess. Rev. Mr. Fletcher is the son of Rev. Dr. and Mrs. Fletcher of Toronto, Canada. Miss King said that as soon as her fiance completes his course at Yale next summer, they will sail for Tokyo, Japan, where both will engage in religious educational work among the Japanese. LaGrangeville, N.Y., where Rev. and Mrs. Fletcher will be located for the next year, is about sixteen miles from Poughkeepsie. In the fall, when the Rev. Mr. Fletcher returns to college, his wife will attend to the ministerial duties at the Christian church there and he will return week-ends to preach at the Sunday services.'

On Friday, August 8th, a party of local people composed of Mr. A.G. Lehman, Mrs. Elias Lehman, also Mrs. Chas. Fader of Akron, Mich., Mrs. Cecil Dawson of Toronto and Mr. Joseph Grove of Ringwood, left Stouffville at two o'clock in the morning for a 500 mile motor trip through a delightful country, making their final destination at Warren, Penn., on Saturday evening. From Toronto the party journeyed over the Hamilton highway to Burlington, thence to Stoney Creek and Niagara Falls, and Hamilton highway. They took breakfast at the Falls, then motored to Port Erie, and ferried the river to Buffalo reaching that city at 10.45 the same morning. From here they went to Westfield, 69 miles, then south along the shore of Lake Chautauqua, a beautiful water 25 miles long and 3 to 6 wide. Passing through Jamestown, N.Y., they reached Warren at 6.36 in the evening. With a party of 18 they came around Lake Chautauqua to Celleron Park where an enjoyable time was spent. The party motored along the Allagani River to Kinzua and Youngville, and on Thursday they started for home, stopping at Vineland. They report the peach crop in this district as just fair with plums and pears plentiful. The mile of unfinished road on the 6th of Markham was the roughest on the whole trip.
