WHITCHURCH VOTERS LIST

Whitchurch Township Voters List has just been issued from the office of The Tribune for the year 1924. The list constitutes the names of all those who are entitled to vote at municipal elections and at elections to the Legislative Assembly. A copy is posted up in every school house and at the office of the clerk. Electors should examine one of these lists to see that he or she are properly on. In case your name is omitted apply at once to the clerk, and if you are entitled to vote you may be added at the Court of Revision.

This voters list contains the names of 1750 persons in the six polling divisions, of which 648 are liable to serve as jurors. Sub-division No. 1, comprising the whole of concessions 1, 2, 3 and 4, from lots 1 to 17, is much the heaviest division in the township, it having 427 names. The smallest division is No. 6, which includes the 7th concession from lots 18 to 35, the eighth from lots 20 to 35 and the ninth from lots 21 to 35, all inclusive. In this division there are 193 names. However, the township of Whitchurch is steadily growing in the matter of names on the voters list, the summer resorts at Wilcox Lake and at Musselman's being chiefly responsible.
