Notice of Sittings of Revising Officer in the Electoral District of

East York

TAKE NOTICE that Sittings of the Revising Officer for the purpose of hearing complaints or appeals with regard to the Voters' Lists to be used at the Plebiscite held under The Ontario Temperance Act, 1924, for the Electoral District of EAST YORK, will be held to hear complaints as to the Lists of Voters for the various Municipalities, comprised in the said Electoral District, and that His Honor Judge O'Connell will be the Revising Officer.

AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that any voter who desires to complain that his name or the name of any person entitled to be entered on the said list, has been omitted from the same, or that the names of any persons who are not entitled to be voters thereon, may on or before the date mentioned in the fifth column above, apply, complain or appeal to have his name or the name of any other person entered on or removed from the List for the Municipality in question.

AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that such appeals must be by NOTICE IN WRITING IN THE PRESCRIBED FORM, signed by the complainant IN DUPLICATE and given to the local Municipal Clerk, or left for him at his address as stated above, on or before the date indicated.

UXBRIDGE TWP. COUNCIL

Uxbridge Township Council met at Goodwood on Saturday last week. All present, Reeve W. G. Cassie in the chair.

The following communications were received. Copy of resolution passed by Ontario County Advisory Agricultural Council at its meeting held in Uxbridge, requesting a grant of \$25 to help finance Young Men's Plowing competitions throughout the County; from Mr. J. F. Grierson, Clerk of the Peace, Whithy, request for more copies of Voters' Lists, and also from Moderation League and Department of Agriculture, asking for copies of voters' lists.

Mr. Crockery, successor to Mr. Tipper, District Agricultural Representative for Ontario County, waited on the council for a grant to a young men's home plowing competition. Mr. Crockery gave an explanation. They are to plow three acres at home, same to be classed in several different classes and prizes to be awarded for all classes. Plowing to be done and ready for judging by Oct. 9th. If this is carried out the Government will give a grant toward paying prizes and also pay for organizing and judging same. The council after consideration decided to give a grant of \$25.00 towards same if it is carried out. Townships not making the grant will not be allowed to compete.
