THE GASOLINE TAX

Should the Legislature approve of the proposal which Hon. G.S. Henry, Minister of Highways, says he will make, for a tax on gasoline of probably 2 cents a gallon, it will mean that Ontario car users will contribute \$2,000,000 more or less next year.

The tax will be collected at the source of supply, and will be added to the price that the consumer must pay the retailer.

Township Pays \$1,000 Interim Account to Commissioner McCoy

Council met on Monday at Unionville with all the members present and Reeve Gohn in the chair.

Judge Coatsworth, Chairman of Election Board, with statement of expenses for revising the voters' list in connection with the recent temperance plebiscite for East York.

The total bill for inspecting, fumigating and attending the Provincial Convention amounted to \$329.62.

Dr. C. R. Mackay, Medical Health Officer, presented the yearly report of the Board of Health. The doctor states that during the year the following infectious cases reported:

Scarlet fever 32 cases, 1 death; diphtheria 6 cases, no deaths; measles 26 cases, no deaths; whooping cough 212 cases, no deaths; chicken pox 8 cases, no deaths.
