EDITORIAL COMMENT

The poor girl who hasn't enough clothes on these days to keep herself warm is either terribly poor or awfully fashionable.

Twenty-one glistening wolf pelts reached the department of game and fisheries last week, mostly from the Rainy River district. The shippers claimed the usual bounty. In all 400 wolf pelts have been received by the department this year from various parts of the province.

At the last session of the Ontario Legislature, new statutory conditions regarding fire insurance were passed, which became effective Jan. 1, 1925. The new Act makes it obligatory for every fire insurance company to issue new policies for all insurance maturing in 1925. Therefore no renewal receipts will be issued this year, but all policies will be rewritten. Three year policies that do not mature until next year or the year after will, of course, stand until they expire. This enactment entails an enormous amount of work and expense on the Companies and agents, as thousands of policy forms and wordings will be thrown into discard, and the entire policy rewritten. On the new ones printed in their stead, the number of conditions is the same, twenty-four. Some of the conditions have been made clearer by expansion, and others have been entirely recast. The new conditions should be carefully read by every insurer.

The action of the Uxbridge Township Council as taken at their last meeting towards having the town-line east of Stouffville, connected up with the Ontario Good Roads System which is built from Uxbridge town to a point east of Goodwood is a commendable undertaking. The council of the Village of Stouffville ought to get busy and help push the matter before the County Council and the Highways Department. To have the York and Ontario Road Systems connected up in this manner would be a distinct advantage to this town. At the present time much of the traffic from the northern part of Ontario County and from Victoria County, going to Toronto is diverted down through Brooklin or through some of the other roads farther east and into Toronto by way of the Kingston Road, because the road systems east of Stouffville are not connected up, and the motorist travels around the other way in order to avoid the bad stretch of road along the town-line between Uxbridge and Whitchurch. A big tourist traffic is also diverted from Toronto out the Kingston Road and then north which would, and should, naturally come through Stouffville. If Stouffville is anxious to develop tourist traffic and a summer camp for motorists, here is one of the first steps to take. The resolution passed by Uxbridge township council appears in this issue of The Tribune.

MARKHAM TP. COUNCIL

The Council elect met at Victoria Hall, Unionville, on Jan. 12th, at 11 a.m. as per statute and after taking the declaration of office and qualification, the members took their seats as follows: W. C. Gohn, reeve; John R. Campbell, 1st deputy-reeve; R. L. Stiver, 2nd deputy-reeve; J. S. Honey and E. J. Jarvis, councillors.

The reeve gave a brief survey of the business for the year, and said he had every confidence that the members would work together harmoniously and in the best interests of the township.

Communications were read from—Lennox & Thompson, writing for A. G. Gormley, re barberry hedge on G.A.M. Davison's place adjacent to Gormley's farm, requesting the council to have same destroyed.

Naughton & Jenkins, township solicitors, with statement of account for year:—Allen ditch \$100.30; Dean claim \$3; re barberry hedge (advising council that township was under no obligation to order hedge cut down or destroyed) \$3; A. B. Haley, sub-division agreement \$15; Thompson plan \$5, total \$126.30.

Ontario Municipal Association, inviting delegates to annual convention in Toronto, Jan. 15th.

Department of Public Highways, enclosing necessary forms of bylaws with respect to township roads improvement and necessity of appointing of road superintendent in order to secure government grant of 30% on road expenditure and 50% of salary of road superintendent. The letter explains that the Provincial subsidies came into effect on the 1st day of January, 1925, and in order for the township to take advantage of the provisions of the act the necessary bylaws must be passed at the first meeting and forwarded in duplicate to the Department of Highways.

The Board of Trustees of the Police Village of Unionville wrote that they make application to you and request and require you, under the provisions of the Act, 15-22, including Sec. 516, to submit a bylaw for the assent of the Electors of Unionville to borrow \$1,000 for the purchase of fire engines and other appliances for fire protection, and for the issue of debentures payable in 9 years in equal instalments. Signed, J. J. Dixon and Mark Maynard, trustees. (Received Dec. 22, 1924.)

Applications for the position of Township Road Superintendent were received from E. V. Thompson of Unionville (accompanied by recom-

mendations of fitness and experience from ex-warden Wm. Keith and E. A. James); also application from J. A. Mitchell of Ringwood.

Applications for the office of assessor were received from:—for east half A. Forster, R. Lunau, L. Summerfeldt and Wm. E. Risebrough; west half, Louis L. Nichols and J. A. Thompson. N. J. Snellie, assessor for west half last year, wrote that he did not want the appointment this year.

The council made the following estimate of expenditure for 1925 under the Public Highways Act:—
Road construction \$26,000
Bridge construction 10,000
Machinery 500
Superintendent 1,500
Maintenance and repair 4,000
\$42,000

Resolutions were passed:—

That the reeve grant his order on the treasurer to pay each deputy-returning officer \$5 and mileage at 10 cents per mile two ways; each poll clerk \$2, and each constable \$2 and for each polling booth \$3; and to the returning officer \$10 for services delivering ballot boxes to deputy-returning officers.

That a grant of \$10 be made to the Hospital for Sick Children.

The council, after discussing the request from the Trustees of the Police Village of Unionville, decided to return the same to the new Board of Trustees and ask them to make another request, as this notice had been received after the council had adjourned sine die and a new trustee board had since been elected in Unionville.

A bylaw appointing sheep valuers for the township was passed with the blanks filled with the names of W. Brooks, west half and F. H. Stiver and Truman Holden east half at salary of \$3 per day and 10 cents per mile each way.

A bylaw to appoint members of the Board of Health was passed with blanks filled as follows: Medical Board of Health, W. C. Gohn, G.A.M. Davison, A. J. Campbell; Medical Health Officer, Dr. C. R. McKay; Sanitary Inspector, Eric V. Thompson, at the rate of \$3 per day while so employed.

A bylaw was passed to provide for expenditure on roads in the township for 1925, with blanks filled as follows: The sum of \$32,000 for construction; the sum of

\$8000 for maintenance and repair; the same to be expended and performed in accordance with the act.

A bylaw was passed appointing Eric V. Thompson, Road Superintendent for 1925 at a salary of \$50 per month for the winter months and \$90 a month for 9 months, and mileage allowance for use of his car, his duties to be as provided by the Highways Act and per instruction of the council.

The council adjourned to meet on Monday, Feb. 9th, at 1 p.m.
