EDITORIAL COMMENT

A unique municipal election is reported from the village of Tweed; Ont. Every vote on the list was polled. This is a record worth noting.

At the session of the Ontario County Council which concluded last Saturday, a bylaw was passed ratifying the separation agreement between the County and the City of Oshawa in accordance with the arbitrator's award handed in some time ago. The Council decided to levy a two-mill rate for the county to be expended on roads, bridges and maintenance of the present roads which will yield a revenue of \$16,000, and with a like amount which the Government will pay, the sum of \$92,000 will be spent on road construction this year.

There has been an agitation going on in different sections of the country with a view to having the Government reimburse depositors who lost money in the Home Bank. Before the Government could very well take any action along this line one would think that depositors who lost in the Farmer's Bank and other financial concerns, both private and chartered, would have to be reckoned with. More important than making recompense is that the wreckers of these banks and savings institutions be given long terms of imprisonment as a salutary lesson for the sorrow and ruin that they have wrought in so many homes.

A writer in the Country Weekly, says: "For a real heart-breaking nuisance there is nothing to outdo the new nickel five-cent piece. Why, this infernal horror has been inflicted upon an innocent public has not been revealed. As a promoter of profanity and other non-Christian virtues it has no equal. You innocently pass it for a quarter and the recipient brands you for a dead 'beat'. You receive it as a quarter and you are filled with disgust at the smallness of the individual who palmed it on you. The collection plates are filled with the obnoxious coin which the faithful pass to the Lord's treasury as quarters. The thing has no virtues and no friends."

The resolution adopted by the County Council of Welland at its last session, that the Legislature be memorialized to pass some legislation whereby sheep raisers of the Province will be protected in some way from the ravages of dogs, is a wise move. In this country every township pays large sums every year for sheep destroyed by dogs. While the owners of a flock of sheep gets paid the actual value of the sheep destroyed by dogs, yet it does not reimburse him for the loss he sustains, as his entire flock is affected and never does as well once they are molested by dogs. What is needed is legislation that will safeguard the sheep raisers from this waste. The owners of dogs must be made responsible in some more stringent way.

The cost of education has greatly increased during the last few years and the question might well be asked, if we are getting value for the money expended. The expenditure of our schools in Ontario now reached the sum of \$48,000,000 a year, and the provincial expenditure on other educational objects exceeds \$5,500,000, so that Ontario's total expenditure upon education reaches \$53,500,000 yearly. This expenditure is on behalf of 680,000 children of different ages, and we have 17,000 teachers engaged in the task. On the average we are spending about \$80 per year for the education of each child of school age; and if we estimate the school age to run from six to sixteen years, it will mean that the province is investing about \$800 in the education of each of its citizens. It is surely a good business proposition to insist that the money be spent in that way which shall secure for each child the education he, or she, most needs to fit them for life's tasks.

THE COUNTY ASSESSMENT

York County Council last week adopted the report of the bylaws committee equalizing the assessment of the county. It provides that the assessment in some sections shall be increased, and Stouffville was boosted \$20,000, which is about the natural increase put on by the town assessor. Last year \$28,000 was added to our county assessment, making a total of \$48,000 in two years. The general assessment of the county is increased from \$69,634 to \$71,707,935.

According to the revised list, the various townships and the assessments are: Georgina, \$962,028; Etobicoke, \$5,837,259; North Gwillimbury, \$1,302,450; East Gwillimbury, \$2,140,698; King, \$4,148,186; Markham, \$4,801,888; Scarboro, \$6,321,633; Vaughan, \$4,525,178; Whitby, \$2,565,936; York, \$19,925,247; North York, \$5,693,836; East York, \$9,843,598.
