### EDITORIAL COMMENT

In times gone by the women wore a gown called Mother Hubbard; today the style resembles more that dear old lady's cupboard.

Down in Halifax a novel way is suggested to have taxes paid. It is proposed that all who are in arrears in tax payments and who possess automobiles be prohibited from using them until their taxes are paid up. What a rest a lot of cars would get in a city like Toronto if such a law was put on the Ontario Statutes.

A warrant was issued at Southampton Saturday last for a man for fraud. He sold a load of wood and dumped it in the yard of the purchaser and when piled and measured next day there was only two-thirds as much wood as he claimed there was. Did you ever stop to consider this when selling a load of short measured wood?

Is five per cent beer intoxicating? Well, that depends on several considerations. It depends on how much one takes. A teaspoonful would not affect many. It depends on the person. A glass would have an intoxicating effect on some people and very little effect on others. It depends upon what one calls intoxication. Is it mere exhilaration, or insanity or paralysis? For practical purposes it depends on the average effect of a considerable quantity on the easily intoxicated person.

The Chesley Enterprise (Liberal) has this to say respecting the five millions of money to be voted by the Dominion Government to the Home Bank depositors, which was largely a Catholic institution, and consequently many of their churches and priests lost heavily: "Those Home Bank depositors are to get a grant from the public treasury. It seems to us a bad precedent. Those who lost money by the failure of other banks are just as much entitled to a percentage on their losses as the Home Bank depositors. With an empty treasury, where's the money coming from? It will mean an increase of our public debt." We would point out that a Tory government once granted similar relief to the depositors in the Farmers' Bank, and the Senate promptly killed the bill. Senate may do likewise this time, but it is not so likely in view of the church being involved.

A proposal to amend the Criminal Code so as to deal with cruelty to animals has been made, and at the request of the Provincial Humane Society an amendment has been drafted to deal with these cases where men neglected to properly feed animals, for it frequently happens that a man who actively abuses his animals likewise half starves and neglects them. The proposed amendment provides that any person is guilty of an indictable offence who, having the custody of any cattle, poultry, dog, domestic animal or bird or wild animal in captivity, "knowingly fails to provide sufficient water, food, and shelter" for the same. The neglect or the ill-treatment of dumb animals is one of the lowest forms of human depravity. Helpless creatures dependent upon mankind for food and bodily comfort have no means of attracting notice or securing redress when subject to neglect. It remains for such organizations as the Humane Society to interest themselves in cases of criminal neglect and to protect God's creatures from the cruelty or calloused indifference that causes untold suffering.

### MARKHAM BOOKS WERE WELL KEPT

The special audit or investigation into the Township of Markham books as kept by Clerk Mr. G.A.M. Davison, is over, and at a meeting of Markham council on Monday it was duly received, showing that the books had been properly and regularly kept, without a blemish of any kind on the clerk. The audit extended over all the time Mr. Davison held the office. That there was not even a suspicion of anything being wrong, induces many to think that the law should be changed so that where an audit is asked by people with a personal grudge who fail to produce any evidence whatever, those responsible for such an audit should have to pay the expense incurred.

The audit has been in progress for more than three months, has cost the municipality and village of Unionville, more than \$2,000, and results in the complete vindication of the township clerk, and coupled with that a commendation of the condition of the books.

The report of the auditor is a voluminous document covering hundreds of pages of typewritten matter and deals with every phase of the work from the inception of Mr. Davison's duties to the present.

An offer made by Mr. Davison prior to the examination of the books, that if any inaccuracies were found he would pay the entire cost, assuming the petitioners would adopt a similar course if the audit proved the accounts were all right, was not accepted by the petitioners, with the result that the entire cost will be borne by the Township of Markham.

### MARKHAM TOWNSHIP NOTICE

#### LOAD OF VEHICLES ACT

Public Notice is hereby given that said Act provides that during the months of March and April in each year, vehicles operating or object being moved over or upon a public highway, which is not within a city or separated town, and having a carrying capacity exceeding one ton, shall not be loaded in excess of one-half the rated carrying capacity of such vehicle or object without a permit as provided by said Act.

The Act also provides that notwithstanding such permit the owner driver or operator of such vehicle or object, is responsible for any damage caused to a highway by such vehicle or object.

A penalty not exceeding \$100.00 is provided for a contravention of any of the provisions of said Act.

Notice is also hereby given that the provisions of the said Act will be strictly enforced with respect to the highways under the jurisdiction of the Township of Markham.

Road Commissioners are hereby instructed to watch their respective sections for overloaded vehicles, according to said Act, causing damages to the Township roads, and act accordingly.
