This condition is caused by the heavy rains and general spring floods, and is not in any way a dangerous condition. An examination made of the reservoirs only a few days ago shows that the splendid work done last summer withstood the winter in excellent shape. The water in both reservoirs is quite cloudy, especially in the old reservoir, but there is no wash into them from the banks, and a few bright sunny days with more settled weather will quickly change the water to its usual sparkling condition. Until the citizens are warned otherwise, the water supply may be used with reasonable safety.

Walter Muston, florist, of Stouffville, who died February 10th, left, according to the will just probated, an estate valued at \$20,893 to his widow, who is made sole executrix. She is the sole beneficiary. The estate is composed of \$16,054 in Stouffville real estate, \$2,500 insurance, and business interests of \$2,339.

There is a most flagrant disregard for the town bylaw forbidding the riding of bicycles on the sidewalks. Besides selections by the band under E. S. Hodgins, the following contributed interesting selections: Wm. Coates, cornet soloist; Dorothy Lawson and Yvonne Hodgins, vocal; J. Hagerman, clarinet; E. Pike, saxophone and Chu Hoy, Chinese violin music. Proceeds amounted to \$80. Reeve Silvester acted as chairman.

Mrs. Catherine Johnston of the west end received a rather severe shock on Wednesday evening last week. While leaving from the rear entrance of the Methodist church, following the prayer meeting, she stepped into one of the extended pieces of brick work on the south side of the building, receiving a nasty wound on the head. "Thy word shall be as a lamp unto my feet," hasn't sufficient literal bearing to make it possible for adherents to get out the side of the church, unless the moon is doing double duty in the absence of electric light at this particular place.

The local hydro electric light system was out of business last Thursday afternoon and until 7.45 in the evening, necessitating the householders resurrecting the discarded lamp or lantern. As the trouble which cut off the supply of power was down near Niagara, a portion of Toronto suffered similar inconvenience to Stouffville, Markham and other municipalities along the line. It was the first interruption of any length since the system was installed a year and a half ago, although there have been minor interruptions of very short duration. People who were forced to use a lamp in the homes were greatly impressed with the seeming inefficiency of the once up-to-date light which supplanted the candle.
