EDITORIAL COMMENT

Wall paper which has hung for two hundred years on the walls of a house in Gloucestershire is being removed and used to fit up a Queen Anne room in the South Kensington Museum.

A Jewish vessel with 500 Zionist passengers and 4000 tons of farm implements donated by Nathan Strauss, a rich Hebrew of the City of New York, recently left New York for the Holy Land. As this is the first time in over 2000 years that the Jewish flag has been unfurled on the high seas, it will be heralded by many bible students as presaging the speedy arrival of the millennium.

There appears to be no end to the looseness which has been practised in some of the departments of the Ontario Government. Two more trusted officials, W. W. Dunlop Inspector of Prisons and Public Charities, and F. C. Williams his associate, were placed under arrest last week as a result of the audit being conducted by the Provincial Secretary's department. The shortage of \$8,000 in Mr. Dunlop's case is said to be in connection with the government's brick plant at Mimico during the "merry-go-round" of the four years of the Drury government. Additional arrests of employees at the Queen Street Asylum were made, for stealing groceries.

In future there will only be a municipal license to collect from pool rooms, as the Ferguson Government has decided to take off the Provincial license, heretofore collected, and thus leave this form of taxation to the municipalities. Some of our exchange papers see in this a boost for the pool room man, on behalf of the government. That's just what it will amount to if the municipalities are too slow to revise their local bylaw so as to get the tax for the municipality which is now collected by the government. There has been a strong feeling that governments are taking too much from the municipal field of taxation, but here is a place where they have relinquished their hold in favor of the town or village with a pool room. Will it be taken advantage of?

Here's the way an American contemporary sizes up the need situation:—"What this country needs is not a new birth of freedom, but the old-fashioned \$2.00 lower berth. "What this country needs isn't liberty, but less people who take liberties with our liberty. "What this country needs isn't a job for every man, but a real man for every job. "What this country needs isn't to get more taxes from the people, but for the people to get more from the taxes. "What this country needs is not more miles of territory, but more miles to the gallon. "What this country need is more paint on the old places and less paint on the young faces. "What this country needs isn't a lower rate of interest on money but a higher interest is work."

THE LATE WM. F. STRACHAN

A very sad and unexpected death was that of Mr. Wm. F. Strachan, which occurred at his home in Oro Township, near Barrie, Saturday morning, Feb. 28th, after a brief illness of nine days with spinal meningitis and pneumonia setting in on Friday evening. The late Mr. Strachan who has a number of relatives near Stouffville, was born in Markham, York County, sixty-five years ago, and went to Oro with his parents when about eight years of age, where he spent the rest of his life. He was well known through his various activities and as a life-long member of Oro Central Presbyterian church. He was married to Miss Elizabeth Paisley of South Orillia, March 5th, 1893, who survives him with three sons and two daughters, namely: James of Orillia, Wm. G. of Oro, Mrs. A. Taylor of Edgar, Joseph and Myrtle at home. Mr. Strachan also leaves one sister, Mrs. Duncan Morrison of Mitchell Square. His brother, the late Robt. Strachan, predeceased him by five months. The many beautiful floral tributes and the large crowd of friends who gathered to pay their last respects to one who was beloved by all, at the funeral, which was held from his home in Oro on Tuesday, March 3rd, to Knox cemetery, showed the high esteem in which the deceased was held.
