COUNCIL TO SET A "TIN CAN" DAY

The April meeting of the local municipal council was held on Friday evening. Reeve Silvester occupied the head of the table while the sides were adorned with the personages of Councillors H. W. Sanders, John Cleaver, and Jos. Borinsky. Councillor Silversides was absent selling out a farmer over in Uxbridge Township.

The amount of business to transact was not by any means onerous, consisting chiefly of passing accounts. The matter of having a day set apart for the collection of tin cans, and other rubbish, save vegetable matter, was broached by the reeve. The proposal was nearly "canned" however, when Councillor Sanders demurred about using the new dumping grounds purchased last year. His objections were finally overcome, and Mr. Sanders agreed to give the new grounds a try-out. They can be immediately closed any time by the Board of Health, should the disposal of tin cans prove a public nuisance. The Reeve and street committee will set a day shortly, and all citizens will be notified in these columns that they may have cans drawn to the dump by placing them in an easily accessible place. Do not let the opportunity slip by to rid your premises of unsightly rubbish. Watch for the date. There will be no charge made for this service.

The council decided to shortly make a tour of inspection of the town streets to ascertain the needed repairs to sidewalks and roadways. With this first-hand information the citizens will not become inquisitive when they see five serious looking gentlemen passing their homes.

A petition signed by Margaret Neal, J.C. Neal and Martha McQuain asked for a sidewalk on Albert street west side, to Edward street on the east, with proper crossing at Edward street. Perry Valentine also petitioned for a water service for his house in the east end.

ONE CHURCH GOES BACK

In looking over the principal religions in Canada according to the 6th Census we find that in the decade from 1911 to 1921 only one denomination went back numerically and that is the Congregationalist which had a membership of 34,054 in 1911 and 30,730 in 1921. The Anglican Church in the same ten years made the largest increase of any Protestant sect, increasing from 1,043,017 to 1,407,994. The Presbyterians come next in numerical strength to the Anglicans and in the same period of time show an increase from 1,115,324 to 1,409,407 followed closely by the Methodists with an increase from 1,079,892 in 1911 to 1,159,458 in 1921. In the same time the Baptists increased from 382,666 to 421,781. The Menonites, including the Hutterites, are among the religious sects which are more than holding their own in Canada. There were 31,797 of this belief according to the census of 1901 in Canada. This had increased to 44,611 in 1911 and to 53,797 in the next decade. There are 3,389,636 Roman Catholics in Canada, a gain of over half a million in ten years. A little over two million of the Roman Catholic population of Canada is in Quebec. In ten years the Jews in Canada increased from 74,564 to 125,197 and more than one-quarter or 34,377 of the Jews of this country are in the City of Toronto. There are 45,674 Jews in the City of Montreal. Mr. Jacobs, a Jew, sits in the Canadian Parliament as the representative of a Montreal constituency.

BUMPER SUCCESS IS 6TH OF MARKHAM TO BE COMPLETED

The Toronto and York Roads Commission have recently advertised for tenders for the construction of the mile and a quarter of unfinished road on the Sixth concession of Markham, just to the south of the Whitechurch - Markham townline. Four tenders have been received and the contract will likely be awarded at the next meeting. This information is authentic. The Tribune having been in communication with County Engineer James on the matter, and it will dispose of the many enquiries as to whether the road is to be built this year or not.

It is expected that one of the first pieces of road undertaken this spring by the Commission will be the section of road referred to above. The announcements in the public press made by the Ontario Motor League, are therefore incorrect when they omit in the road program the Sixth concession of Markham. The Commission, of course, are in no way responsible for these reports handed out by the League.

GRAND OLD MOTHER CALLED HOME

Mrs. Simeon Stouffer, one of the fine old mothers who witnessed the transition of this part of Ontario from virgin forest to its present high state of cultivation, passed peacefully to the Great Beyond at the home of her daughter, Mrs. George Collard, on Sunday morning, April 5th, 1925, at the advanced age of 82 years.

The late Mrs. Stouffer was a daughter of Thos. L. Webb, a pioneer resident of King Township, she being of a family of nine children. Mrs. Stouffer was born at Kettleby where she was married 57 years ago, thus entering on a long and happy wedlock, the duration of which fortune is pleased to favor but few. Immediately settling on Mr. Stouffer's farm just north of the Canadian National station at Stouffville, they lived all these years on the farm. About fifteen years ago Mr. Stouffer sold the farm to D. H. Rusnell, reserving a lot for a home to which they retired.

The late Mrs. Stouffer was a woman kindly disposed, cheerful and of a most ambitious disposition. She was full of zeal and energy for the welfare of her children, and it must have been her great joy to witness their splendid progress as they stepped out into life well versed and mindful of the great essentials.

Besides her husband she is survived by a family of three daughters and one son, namely: Mrs. Geo. Collard of Stouffville, Mrs. Ernest Dougherty of Denver, Col., and Mrs. Perkins also of Colorado, who is one of the few women to be called to the American Bar, and having practised as a solicitor. An only son Fred is living in Puyallup, Washington. Owing to circumstances the son and daughters from a distance were unable to attend the funeral.

Interment took place on Tuesday at Stouffville cemetery, following divine service at the home of Mrs. Collard, led by Rev. Geo. E. Coulter and Rev. R. Young. The late Mrs. Stouffer was a member of the Methodist church for half a century.
