EDITORIAL COMMENT

A vigorous campaign has started in Whitby and on the Provincial highway between that town and Toronto, against auto speeders. Many drivers of cars, including Toronto firms; have been summoned the past week. Most of the offenders are said to have travelled over 40 miles an hour. A similar campaign should be started all over the province.

In reply to a question in the Legislature the Minister of Highways pointed out that for 1924 the cost of the different types of road constructed were: Asphaltic concrete \$30,000 to \$35,000 per mile; cement concrete \$23,232 per mile (average); bituminous penetration \$19,900 per mile macadam \$9,300 per mile, using local stone; \$12,000 per mile, using commercial stone; grading \$1,563 per mile; cement concrete \$3,232 per mile (average).

We were just wondering, after reading the contradictory evidence given at a certain police court trial, how many people have the slightest idea of the serious nature of an oath given at a certain court trial to "tell the whole truth and nothing but the truth." It is quite possible that taking an oath to tell nothing but the truth is, to many people, but a necessary form to be gone through with under compulsion and to be evaded or forgotten at first opportunity. The great majority of all court trials are interspersed with contradictory evidence, evasions and equivocations, and when one stops to consider that every witness is under oath to tell the truth it is to be wondered that somebody is not held and charged with perjury. Of course if everybody told the whole truth there would be little need of a judge and jury.
