

EDITORIAL COMMENT

What a delight for mother to have the road oil cleaned in Stouffville right after housecleaning.

Fifty-two men are seeking the position of assistant police chief in Campbellford. The town might ask them all to try the job for a week, and thus they would save a year's salary.

Judging by the activity in the political ranks of both Liberals and Conservatives a Dominion election is very close at hand. Everywhere both great parties are hurrying candidates into the field.

Eighty per cent. of the world's known supply of asbestos is to be found in Canada. Its positive fireproofing and heat conserving qualities make it indispensable for many uses which are constantly increasing. Last year we exported about \$9,000,000 worth, raw and manufactured, but largely raw. If it were possible to have Canadian labor entirely convert this great raw material into the finished product, it would mean much for the workmen of Canada.—Milverton Sun.

The machinery from the stone quarry west of Walkerton was moved back to Toronto last week, and thus we see the end of the Drury government's cement plant, which bid fair to prevent a cement famine for the next generation at least. MARKHAM TP. COUNCIL

Clerk and Treasurer Raised to \$1500 Salary

A special meeting of the council was held at Unionville to map out the culvert and bridge work, and open tenders for new bridges at Hood's on 9th concession.

H. F. Mann of Box Grove, was heard complaining of state of sideroad from Al. Pike's east to the 9th and was told arrangements had already been made with Abram Raymer to fix the same.

Seven tenders were received for the building of a bridge on 9th con. between lots 16 and 17—55 ft. span and cement floor. The tenders ranged in price from \$4,213.15 to \$8,097. W. P. R. Holdcroft of Kingston was the lowest tenderer and was awarded the contract. The bridge is to be completed in two months.

Councillors Honey and Stiver were allotted work in the remaining portions of the township.

The council discussed the refencing of certain cemeteries requiring same and decided to get in touch with certain families interested in upkeep of same.

Deputy-Reeve Campbell brought to the attention of the council the recommendation made by the auditors, that the tax bills be sent out by the treasurer and the taxes to be collected through the different bank branches located in the township. He pointed out that under the present system of collection the great bulk of the money was collected this way, and that after the close of the year the balance could be collected by the township constable. The extra percentage added would about repay the cost for collecting this, which came at a time when Mr. Thomson was not very busy repairing roads. After a short discussion the matter was left over for consideration next meeting.
